Muldraugh Hill Baptist Church History The First 100 Years (1874 - 1974)

Muldraugh Hill Baptist Church, located in Lebanon, Kentucky, celebrated its 100th Anniversary October 27, 1974. In anticipation of this event, **Irene Maupin**, **Emogene Farmer**, and **Barbara Jean Benningfield** were assigned to compile a history of the church. We appreciate their time and effort in this endeavor.

The following information is what they compiled from church records and bulletins, associational minutes, the local newspaper (*Lebanon Enterprise*), personal interviews and other histories. This information is presented with the hope that it will recall many precious memories and renew an appreciation for the heritage of the church.

It is generally believed that **Muldraugh Hill Church** grew out of a Baptist church at New Market which was destroyed by a tornado in 1870. An article in the March issue of the *Lebanon Clarion* described the destruction caused by the tornado. The following story is printed as it appeared in the newspaper:

HURRICANE AT NEW MARKET Trees Uprooted, Fences Swept Away and Houses Leveled with the Ground. TWO CHURCHES IN RUINS Great Destruction of Property

The village of New Market, six miles west of this city on the Campbellsville turnpike, was visited last Saturday by a terrible tornado. The ravages of the tempest were confined to a few moments of time and to a small district of country; but they were of such a character that none that saw them wish ever to see the like again. The amount of property destroyed was very considerable, and the exemption from loss of human life, in view of the violence of the storm, seems like a special Interposition of Providence.

BEGINNING AND COURSE

About five o'clock in the afternoon there came up a heavy shower of rain, which lasted only a few minutes, and was immediately succeeded by the hurricane. The storm began its work of destruction beyond the Rolling Fork, not far from the residence of Mrs. Eliza Schooling, uprooting trees, sweeping away fences and demolishing houses, until it reached the eastern limits of the village, where it divided, the principal portion rising and the remainder taking an eastern direction. The course of the tornado through the village was almost exactly on the line of the Lebanon and Campbellsville turnpike.

ATMOSPHERIC PHENOMENA

The tornado occurring in the daytime, its phenomena were attentively noted by a number of persons whose statements, taking into consideration their different standpoints, are remarkably consistent. A gentleman residing near the north-eastern limits of the village says that his attention was first attracted by a brillant light, apparently about the barn of Mrs. Massingale, which led him to believe for the moment that the building was on fire. It is hardly necessary to remark that, in such cases, men observe quickly and think fast. A moment later-in much less time than it requires to write it-he beheld a dark mass about the breadth of an average-sized house, with numerous bright intersecting lines not unlike chain lightning, and with a fiery-red border at the top. This same phenomenon was observed by others, and all testifying that it expanded and contracted as it proceeded on its way, the lines of light continually shifting, and the whole mass revolving, seething and boiling. At the bridge, just beyond the Presbyterian church; this mass was observed to pause and stretch out to the breadth of some thirty or forty yards, the base resting on the earth and the summit out of sight-then, as if having gathered fresh power from the delay, it swept up the slope, carrying every-thing before it.

PARTIAL LIST OF LOSSES

The barn, crib and stable of Mr. Samuel Roberson were blown down and a buggy torn up. The windows of his dwelling were broken by the wind.

A large barn belonging to Mrs. Massingale was destroyed, her carriage house blown over, and the carriage broken.

The smoke-house of Mr. David Walker was torn to pieces, his stable unroofed, crib blown down, and the top of the L part of his dwelling carried away. A rockaway standing in the yard was lifted some 15 feet into air, turned over, dashed to the ground and broken. The windows of Mrs. Lizzie Newcomb's residence were blown out and the chimney broken off. Her stable was blown and a wagon broken. A blacksmith shop owned by Mrs. Newcomb, was occupied by George and Matt Mobley, was blown down.

Mr. Ed. Luckett had a barn and two cribs torn to pieces, and lost several stacks of hay and 3000 bundles of fodder.

The L part of the dwelling of Thomas Hicks was unroofed, the front portion lifted up and moved several feet and a chimney broken off. His wagon shed was torn to pieces and the upper part of his stable and crib carried away.

The smoke-house and buggy-house of H. H. Carter were lifted out of their places and moved some distance, his crib unroofed, and a shed blown down. A small quantity of queensware in his store was dashed from the shelves and broken. The walls of his dwelling were sprung, the glass in the windows broken and the tops of the chimneys blown off.

The L portion of Mr. Wayne Ferguson's house was blown down, as was his smoke-house. Two poplar planks and a piece of fence rail were driven through the front portion of his house, from end to end, coming out on the other side. His hen-house was torn to pieces and the chickens blown so far away that they have never been heard from.

Mr. Jacob Miller was one of the heaviest losers. The L portion of his brick dwelling lost the whole of the second story, his kitchen was utterly destroyed, his corn crib and two barns blown down and two valuable horses killed. Every sash and pane of glass in his dwelling was broken and a large quantity of wearing apparel and several beds blown away. A store-house adjoining his residence, containing tobacco and other articles, were destroyed. His loss will amount to thousands of dollars.

The second story and roof of a house belonging to heirs of William Smith, deceased, until lately occupied by John Mobley, was forced down into the first.

The dwelling-house of Mr. George Meese was lifted up and moved forward some eight or ten feet, the entire front and roof torn off and hurled away. The kitchen adjacent was lifted up and

dashed against a tree near by, which prevented it from being carried off. The tree was bent low by the force of the blow, but gallantly held its position. A considerable quantity of clothing belonging to the members of Mr. Meese's family was carried away and almost all of the kitchen furniture destroyed.

THE CHURCHES

The village contained two churches, a brick church belonging to the Baptist denomination, and a frame church owned by the Presbyterians. The Baptist church, in the lower part of town, was about to receive a new roof, for which purpose two large piles of shingles had been deposited near it. One of these was hardly disturbed, while the other scattered to the winds, some of the shingles being carried six miles. The church itself was an utter wreck. With the exception of one corner, of which some eight feet in height remained, the whole edifice was leveled with the ground. The joists, thirty feet in length, were blown in every direction, and some of them forced eight or ten feet into the ground. Nearly all of the larger monuments in the churchyard were broken to pieces. The railing about one of the graves whirled away to an unknown distance, not a splinter being left behind. Another enclosure had about it a fence surmounted by heavy rocks, which were bound together by strong iron bands. Several of these rocks were blown off and the iron clasps were wrenched or broken.

Upon reaching the frame church the storm seems to have attained its utmost fury. After a short pause in the valley below, it rushed up the slope and tore the church to splinters in a moment, scattering the fragments along the side of the road for several hundred yards. Nothing was left but the stoves, floor and some of the seats. Strange to say, the Bible and Sunday School library were not injured.

PERSONS INJURED

One of the most singular features of this tornado is the fact that no human life was lost. Sixtythree persons were in the immediate pathway of the storm, none of whom was fatally injured. Four of Mr. Jacob Miller's family received painful injuries from the falling bricks. Mrs. Thomas Hicks was considerably hurt. Tommy Carter was bruised severly by flying fragments, and his left arm was disabled for the time. Mr. Thomas Taylor was also somewhat injured by a missile of some kind. Various other persons received slight wounds.

INCIDENTS

The bridge over the branch near Mr. Miller's consisted of stout oak puncheons, 20 feet long, eighteen inches in width and two inches thick, which were blown from thirty to two hundred yards, and some of them torn to splinters. One of these puncheons was carried a distance of one hundred yards and cut down a fruit tree in front of Mr. Meese's house. Some of the members of the family of Mr. John Sanders were repeatedly blown into the fire, and it was with great difficulty that they were prevented from burning to death. In the back yard of Mr. Meese there is an excavation, eight or ten feet deep, used as a milk-house. To this, on the approach of the storm, Mr. Meese retired with his family, and to this precaution they are probably indebted for the preservation of their lives. The storm appears to have moved very slowly. Mr. Miller was in his barn and saw it approaching at a distance of something like a hundred yards. He had time to run from one end of the barn to the other and get out before the storm struck it.

A lady's dress was seen to shoot rapidly upward to the height of several hundred feet and sail off. It was thought at the time by the spectators that the lady herself was in it, but fortunately this was not the case.

Singles, fodder and many other small articles which evidently came from New Market, were

found on the farm of Stephen Raley, six miles distant from the point from which they started. Mr. Henry Abell, who lives somewhat nearer to New Market, says that a wagon load of such fragments might have been collected from one of his fields.

The head of an Opossum, evidently recently severed from the body, was found lying in the road, near Mr. Sam Roberson's residence.

The bell of the Presbyterian church was carried some two hundred yards. Some persons residing not more than twenty to fifty yards of the track of the hurricane, were not aware that anything unusual was transpiring, and were quite astonished when their attention was called to the wreck and ruin so near them.

SUMMARY

It is estimated that, exclusive of a number of small out-buildings, 34 or 35 houses were blown down or badly injured. All the fencing and nearly all the fruit trees in the village vanished before the breath of the Storn-King. On Sunday morning the whole face of the country was covered with DEBRIS, and the principal street was filled and obstructed by rails, planks, and fragments from the ruins. Some of the damage has already been repaired, but months, and perhaps years, must elapse before the place will entirely recover from the effects of this visitation of Providence.

RELIEF FOR THE SUFFERERS

The losses entailed by the hurricane fell very heavily upon some of the citizens of the unfortunate village. We are glad to know that a vigorous effort has been made here to obtain contributions for their relief. We understand that a considerable sum has already been realized, but much remains to be done. Contributions of money or other needed articles will be received by Rev. V. E. Kirtley, who has been very active in his endeavors in behalf of these unfortunate persons. We sincerely trust that no one who is able will refuse to contribute to so worthy an object.

Little is known about the age of the New Market Church, except the name does appear in records as early as 1856. On September 22, 1856, New Market Church was dismissed from Russell Creek Association and entered the Lynn Association organized November 8, 1856. The church entered that association on that date with 79 members. In the 1859 minutes of Lynn Association, New Market is listed with 71 members.

A deed was drawn for the ground where **Muldraugh Hill Baptist Church** is presently located on February 3, 1873 with Nathan and Elizabeth Sapp as grantors of the deed. The deed, as written in 1873, is as follows:

This Indenture made this 3rd day of February 1873 between Nathan Sapp and Elizabeth Sapp, his wife, as party of the First part and Thomas Underwood in trust for the use and benefit of the United Baptist Church of Christ as party of the second part Witnesseth. That the parties of the first part for and in consideration of ten dollars to them in hand paid hath bargained and sold and by these presents doth grant bargain and sell and convey to the party of the second part for the use aforesaid a tract of land lying in Marion County on the Campbellsville and Lebanon Turnpike road which is bounded as follows: Beginning at a Sassafras Walnut and Maple on said pike corner to Mr. Livers fence with the pike in the direction of the Rolling Fork 22 poles to a white oak at the end of a ditch cut in a pond on the pike fence East along said ditch 7 poles to a stake then South Il-2 poles to a Spanish Oak and dogwood comes to said Livers fence North 55 west with the line of said Livers 18 poles to the beginning. To have and to hold the said tract of land

with the appurtenances to the said party his heirs and assigns for the use of said church forever with covenant of Special Warranty Witness Our Signature this the day and year first above mentioned.

Nathan Sapp Elizabeth Sapp

Elizabeth Sapp is given as one of the charter members of the Church. However, the name of **Nathan Sapp** does not appear on the records until October 1887, when he along with several others was baptized.

Nathan Sapp not only granted the ground, but he and his son, Perry, were also instrumental in partial construction of **Muldraugh Hill Baptist Church**, as indicated by Perry Sapp's obituary which was in possession of John Hundley, son of the late Rev. W.C. Hundley. The obituary states that William Perry Sapp was born in Marion County, Kentucky, on October 21, 1847, and died October 25, 1930, at the age of eighty-three years and four days. He was the son of Nathan and Elizabeth Vessels Sapp. He was married in 1867 to Susan Bright who died in 1887. To their union were born seven children: W. T. Sapp, G. A. Sapp, J. N. Sapp, Nannie Rice, Zennie Colvin, Carl Sapp, and Frances Horton.

The obituary says that William Perry Sapp united with **Muldraugh Hill Baptist** and was one of the oldest members at the time of his death. He and his father, Nathan Sapp, hewed the sills by hand and donated them to the building of the church. The obituary reads, *"Brother Sapp was born-and reared in sight of this church and will now be laid to rest on a part of his home place where he spent his life."*

Descendants of the Nathan Sapp family are among the membership of the Church today:

- William (Billy) Veatch and his children, Estelle Veatch Brady and Bobby Veatch; David Veatch and his children, Donnie and Jeannie; and Bernard Veatch are descendants of George A. Sapp.
- Descendants of John N. Sapp include Coy, Twyman, Marion, Sudie, Mildred, Mrs. Nettie Sapp Colvin, Mrs. Mabel Sapp Yates, Terry and Steven Yates.
- Descendants of Frances Sapp Horton are J. D. Horton, Dorothy Horton Bishop, and Frances Horton Thompson.



The dedication of **Muldraugh Hill Baptist Church** was announced in the *Lebanon Weekly Standard* on October 13, 1874 by W. L. Ramsey. The article appeared as follows: New Market, Ky., Oct. 13, 1874. Correspondence of the Standard.

Please announce through your paper that the new Baptist Church near the foot of Muldrough's Hill, on the Lebanon and Campbellsville turnpike, is nearly completed. It will be called the Muldrough's Hill Church. The first or introductory sermon will be preached by the writer, on the fourth Sunday in this month at eleven o'clock, and all the members of the old New Market church are requested to meet there on that day at 10 o'clock A.M. The church will be constituted on Saturday before the first Sunday in November, and will be dedicated on the first Sunday in November. The sermon will be preached by Rev. Henry McDonald, of Georgetown, Ky.

W. L. Ramsey

The dedication of the church took place November 4, 1874, with Rev. Henry McDonald preaching the sermon.

Henry McDonald, D.D. was raised up to the ministry, and labored a number of years, within the bounds of Russell Creek Association. He is a native of Ireland, was raised by devout Catholic parents, and was educated with a view to the priesthood. Being averse to becoming a priest, he ran away from his parents, and came to the United States. Making his way to Greensburg, Kentucky, he entered upon the study of law, under Hon. Aaron Harding. Under the preaching of B. T. Taylor, during an extensive revival at Greensburg, young McDonald professed conversion, about 1852, and was baptized into the fellowship of Greensburg church, by Mr. Taylor. He at once abandoned the study of law, and commenced the study of theology, under the directions of John Harding. He was ordained to the ministry, about 1854. After serving the church at Greensburg, some ten years, he accepted a call to Danville, where he ministered about twelve years. From thence he went to Covington, where he remained only a few months, when he accepted a call to the church at Georgetown College.

A brief historical sketch of "**Muldraugh's Hill Church**" is in the minutes of the Russell's Creek Association for 1880 on page 7:

HISTORY OF MULDRAUGH'S HILL CHURCH

This church was constituted with thirteen members, on Saturday before the first Sunday in November, 1874, in a new church building costing \$1500 dedicated on Sunday by a sermon by Bro. McDonald.

A pastor was called on that day, and <u>Bro. Thomas Underwood</u> chosen, who continued his ministration from 1874 until 1879. During the five years in which Bro. Underwood acted as pastor, the church was in a flourishing condition, and at the time he left the church numbered 121 members.

Within this time, however, a great many letters were granted. The first deacons of the church were W. W. Rafferty and E. C. Wise. Afterward Bros. William Faucett and D. Walker were added. And Bro. W. F. Cowherd was ordained August 1, 1878. Bro. Porter Rafferty was our first clerk, serving in that capacity for three years. Bro. D. Walker acted as clerk for one year and was followed by Bro. Moses Farmer. At the expiration of his term, Bro. Wat Richeson assumed the duties, and he is clerk at the present time.

Muldraugh's Hill Church is the outgrowth of the efforts of the Home Mission Board, of Russell's Creek Association, Bro. Thomas Underwood acting as missionary by direction of the Board. The brother canvassed the territory and secured the means for the purchase of the beautiful location and the erection of the church edifice, which is a handsome building, 36 by 54 feet in size, well finished, and paid for. There is a well in the yard. Bro. Underwood spared no pains nor labor in the work, riding all over the territory and superintending in person all the business, for all of which we hope he will have his reward in the world to come. He has been a good and faithful minister in this part of the vineyard, and had it not been for his zeal in the cause, the church in all probability would never have been built.

Records of 1874 through 1878 were burned in the home of the church clerk, Porter Rafferty, whose house was destroyed by fire. For this reason we have two conflicting lists of charter members.

In 1901, 25 years after the church was organized, Bro. J. L. Collins and Porter Rafferty were appointed to prepare a list of the **charter members** of the church. This list includes:

ARTICLES OF FAITH AS ADOPTED BY MULDRAUGH CHURCH AT HER MEETING OF ORGANIZATION (NOVEMBER 14, 1874)

• lst We believe there is only one true and living God whose name Jehovah The Maker and Supreme ruler of heaven and earth. Inexpressibly glorious in holiness worthy of all possible honor confidence and love revealed under the personal distinction of Father Son and Holy Ghost or Spirit Equal in Every office in the great work of Redemption.

- 2nd That the new and old Testament is the infalable word of God and is perfect treasure of heavenly instruction. That it has Salvation for its End and truth without mixture of Error for its matter. That it reveals the, principals by which God judges and therefore is and shall remain to the End of the world the true center of Christian union and the Supreme Standard by which all humane conduct creeds and opinions should be tried.
- 3rd That man was created in a state of holiness under the law of his maker. But by voluntary transgression fell from that holy and happy state in consequence of which all mankind are now sinners not by constraint but choice. Being by nature utterly void of that holiness required by the law of God wholly given to the gratification of their own sinful passions and therefore under just condemnation to eternal ruin without difference or excuse.
- 4th That the Salvation of Sinners is wholly of grace through the mediatorial office of the Son of God who took upon himself our nature yet without Sin honored the Law by his personal obedience and made atonement for our sins. By his Death Being risen from the dead he is now in heaven and uniting in his wonderful person the tenderest Sympathies with the divine perfection in Every way gratified to be a Suitable Compassionate and all Sufficient Saviour.
- 5th That the great gospel blessing which Christ in his fullness bestowed on Such as believe on him is Justification. That Justification consists in the pardon of Sin and the promise of Eternal Life on principals of righteousness that is bestowed not in consideration of any works of righteousness which we have done. But solely through his own redemption and righteousness that it brings us into a State of most blessed peace and favor with God and Secures Every Other blessing needful for time and eternity.
- 6th That the blessing of Salvation are made free to all by the gospel. That it is the immediate duty of all to accept them by a cordial and obedient faith. And that nothing prevents the Salvation of the greatest Sinner on Earth except his own voluntary refusal to submit to the Lord Jesus Christ which rejection will subject him to an aggravated condemnation.
- 7th That in order to be Saved we must be regenerated or born again that regeneration consists in giving wholly disposition to the mind and is effected in a manner above our comprehension or calculation by the power of the Holy Spirit. So as to secure our voluntary obedience to the gospel. And that its proper evidence is found in the holy fruit which we bring forth to the glory of God.
- 8th That such only are real believers as Endeavor to the End that their perserence Attachments to Christ is the ground work which distinguished them from mere professors. That a special providence watches over these wellfare and they are kept by the power of God through faith unto Salvation.
- 9th That the law of God is the eternal and unchangeable rule of his moral government that it is wholly just and good and that the innobility which the Scriptures asscribe to follow man to fulfill its precepts arises entirely from their love of Sin to deliver them from which and to restore them through a mediator to obedience of the holy law is one great end of the gospel and means of grace connected with the establishment of the church.
- 10th That a visable church of Christ is a Congregation of Baptist believers associated by Covenant in the faith and fellowship of the gospel. Observing the ordiance of Christ government by his laws and exercising the gifts, rights, and privileges invested in them by His word. That its only proper Officers are Bishops or fathers and Deacons as defined in the Epistles of Timothy and Titus.
- 11th That Baptism and the Lord's Supper are ordiances of the Church. That Baptism is immersion of a penitent believer in water in the name of the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit by the authority of a church and always preceeds the Lord's Supper. That the Lord's

Supper is the use of Bread and wine to set forth the Sufferings and Death of Christ proceeded by a solemn Self Committal.

- 12th That the first day of the week is the Lord's day or Christian Sabbath and is to be kept Sacred to Religious purposes by abstaining from all secular labor and recreation by the observance of all the means of grace both private and public and preparation for that rest that remaineth for the people of God.
- 13th That there will be a resurrection of the Dead both of Just and the unjust. That there will be a general judgement. That there will be a separation of the righteous and wicked and that the happiness of the Righteous and the punishment of the wicked will be eternal.

CHURCH COVENANT FOR THE UNITED BAPTIST CHURCH OF JESUS CHRIST AT MULDRAUGHS HILL MARION COUNTY, KENTUCKY AS ADOPTED AT ITS ORGANIZATION (NOVEMBER 14, 1874)

As we trust we have been brought by divine grace to embrace the Lord Jesus Christ and by the influence of his spirit to give ourselves up to him so we do now solemnly covenant with each other that God enabling us we will walk together in Brotherly Love that we will exercise a Christian care and watchfulness over each other and faithfully warn rebuke and admonish one another as the care shall require. That we will not forsake the assembling of ourselves together nor omit the great duty of prayer both for ourselves and for others. That we will participate in each others joys and endeavor with tenderness and sympathy to bear each others burdens and sorrows. That we will constantly endeavor to bring up Such as may be under our care in the nurture and admonition of the Lord. That we will seek divine aid to enable us to walk circumspectly and watchfully in the world denying ungodliness and every worldly lust. That we will strive together for the support of a faithful, evangelical ministry among us. That we will endeavor by example and effort to win souls to Christ and through life amidst evil report and good report seek to Live to the glory of Him who hath us brought out of darkness into His marvelous light.

RULES OF DECORUM FOR THE UNITED BAPTIST CHURCH OF JESUS CHRIST AT MULDRAUGH HILL

- lst The Church shall meet for the transaction of business on Saturday before the first Sunday in each month at 11 o'clock A.M.
- 2nd The Church shall have a presiding officer called a moderator whose duty shall be to call the church to order and put all questions that come up by motion and second to the church by voting and in case of a tie give the casting vote but he shall not be allowed to vote in any other case.

- 3rd No member shall have the right of more than three speeches to one question without permission from the church, arising from his seat and addressing the moderator.
- 4th No member following the one who has spoken shall cast any reflection on his speech.
- 5th No member shall call any member by any other term or affiliation except brother or sister.
- 6th All private offenses shall be treated according to the 18th chapter of Matthew.
- 7th All public offenses shall come before the church by the appointment of a committee whose duty shall be to go to the offender and request them to come to the church and make their acknowledgements or defense.
- 8th No member shall have the right to leave church during its session of business except by permission of the moderator.
- 9th There shall be no whispering or talking during the conference of the church.
- 10th All questions shall be decided by a majority of votes cast except in the reception of members when it shall be unanimous.
- 11th No questions shall be debatable or ready for discussion except coming up by motion and second.
- 12th Appointment of Committee.
- 13th It shall take no less than five members to form a forum to transact business of the church.
- 14th In order to defray the expenses that each male member over the age of 21 pay \$2.00 and each male member under the age of 21 years pay \$1,00 and each female over the age of 21 years pay \$1.00 and each female under the age of 21 years pay 50 cents and the rest of the expenses be paid according to what we are worth and a failure to do this we forfeit our membership.
- 15th It shall be the duty of the church to open her doors for the reception of members before the close of the session.

In September 1879 **Rev. E. H. Brookshire** was called to serve as pastor. On Saturday before the fourth Sunday in December 1879, by motion and second, the church agreed to take Bro. Kerkendall to preach one-half of the time for Bro. Brookshire. This continued for a period of about 10 months.

Immediately upon the resignation of E. H. Brookshire, **J. C. Wray** was called as pastor in November of 1883. Financial problems plagued the church, which possibly was the reason for Bro. Wray's short ministry.

The pastor's salary per year depended upon the amount of money the members contributed, although the pastor usually asked for a set salary ranging from \$100.00 to \$250.00. The sexton's salary was from \$9.00 to \$15.00 per year.

Usually a committee of three people was elected to raise subscriptions (money pledged) for the pastor's and sexton's salaries and mission causes. Money raised in this manner was not always sufficient for the needs. Once the church considered imposing an advalorem tax on itself. That the church was hard pressed for funds is evident when on one occasion they decided to "go to the law" to see if they could get Bro. Newton to pay what he owed the church.

The sexton or housekeeper had to furnish his own supplies such as oil for the lamps, brooms, and wood for fires. Besides cleaning the church building, the sexton was also responsible for the upkeep of the racks that were put around the fence for a hitching post.

There is no record of any business meetings between July 1884 and April 1885.

Realizing the struggling condition of the church, **Bro. Thomas Underwood** accepted the pastorate for the second time.

In 1885 the July minutes of the church read as follows:

Saturday before the lst Sunday in July, church met in regular order for the transaction of business. Bro. T. R. Farmer was called to the chair as moderator. The committee consisting of the deacons of the church reported they had concluded the church pledge themselves to pay Bro. Underwood \$50.00 for his services the ensuing year and all money paid by persons not members, he receives in addition to the \$50.00. Moved and seconded the church pledge themselves to pay the amount as suggested by the deacons. Motion carried. Bro. Underwood accepted the call of the church.

An exerpt from the Lebanon newspaper reads:

New Market - September 14, 1885 Rev. Thomas Underwood, assisted by Rev. V. E. Kirtley, has been conducting a series of meetings at **Muldraugh's Hill Church**, resulting in 11 accessions. The baptizing took place at the river on Friday. Mr. Kirtley is an able divine, and has greatly endeared himself to this people.

Less than a year later, upon the resignation of Bro. Underwood, **Rev. V. E. Kirtley**, in August of 1886, accepted the call of the church to preach twice monthly (lst and 3rd Sundays) for a salary of \$200.00.

The automobile was practically non-existent in the late 1800's. Before people had automobiles to drive, they generally walked or traveled by horseback or some kind of horse-drawn carriage. One naturally concludes then, that transportation and weather conditions at this time greatly affected church attendance. In fact the records of April 1887 state:

Saturday before the lst Sunday in April 1887, the church met and after preaching by the pastor, the church became organized for the transaction of business. There being no reference from last meeting and as the weather and roads having been bad through the winter. In consequence of which the congregation has been small and the clerk having been absent, we are minus a record since September. On motion and second it is ordered that the minutes of this meeting show that the State meeting since September has been attended by the pastor and that Bro. C. F. Putman put in his membership with this church at the September meeting and that Bro. Charley Russell united with church at the January meeting. Motion and Second to adjourn.

In connection with transportation by horseback or carriage, an amusing incident was related to the committee by almost every older person with whom they talked:

One Sunday morning a Mrs. Lucy Carter rode in her Phaeton to church, hitched her mare and went inside. While the worship services were in progress, the mare gave birth to a colt, a scene visible to the whole congregation through the church windows. Mr. Wash Moore came to the aid of the poor animal, releasing her from the carriage and rendering such assistance as necessary.

Afterwards, someone remarked, "It would surely be a good horse for it was born at a good place on a good day."

In a *"History of Kentucky Baptists"* by J. H. Spencer he states the protracted meeting became a feature of the polity of the Baptist church as far back as 1837. Hitherto, even during revival seasons, meetings were held only on Saturday and Sunday with an occasional night meeting, and that usually met at a private home; and the most zealous enterprising minister could not stretch his conscience beyond a 3 day meeting. But now the meetings began to be pro-tracted from day to day during a period of two weeks.

When the revival season passed the church continued to meet once a month, have Saturday and Sunday preaching, and exercise strict discipline over its members. But there were few additions to the church by experience and baptism "till another revival season came around and after the church would be much diminished in numbers by death and exclusion."

In September 1887 Dr. A. C. Graves assisted Bro. Kirtley in a protracted meeting at **Muldraugh Hill** described as "a joyous revival of religion."

A protracted meeting is discussed by Rev. V. E. Kirtley in a letter to the Russell's Creek Association. It is unknown when **Muldraugh Hill** joined the Russell Creek Association.

Letter to the Russell's Creek Association from United Baptist Church of Jesus Christ at **Muldraughs Hill** in Marion County, Kentucky. To the Russell's Creek Association when convened with East Fork Church in Metcalf County, Kentucky in September 1887 is as follows:

Dear Brethering

Since we last wrote you we have reason and we trust feel to thank God for his love and mercies and kind dealings with us through the past years. True we have not enjoyed the blessings of the Lord as it has been our privelege to do or as we might have done and death has claimed and taken from our number several of our beloved brothers and sisters in Christ (members of our church) and among the number is one that you have often met and counseled with in your association and that many of you have heard preached the Word of God that he doubtless proved the power of God to the saving of your own souls and will still prove that power to all that will yet believe that preached word. We mourn for our beacon light has gone-the Time Honored Servant of God that founded this church and spent his last with us has gone to his reward. (Bro. Underwood) But we have had Bro. V. E. Kertley to preach for us twice a month through the past year and the Rev. Dr. Graves to assist him in a series of meetings which is now about to close and results in great good. Our membership has been very much received. We have had forty-nine (49) conversions and forty-seven (47) will be baptized tomorrow and four (4) have joined by letter. God will be praised for his blessings. Pray for us Brethering that we may ever enjoy the love and grace of God in our hearts and that our efforts may be to advance the interest of His cause and kingdom in the earth. Failing to get a volunteer we send no one to sit with you in your councils at this session. We trust your wisdom and council.

Our membership now stands as follows: Males 67 Females 88 Total 155 Lost since our last report are 7 by death, 7 by letter and 16 by revision of list.

This is the first mention of Nathan Sapp's name on record after giving the ground for the church site.

Under Bro. Kirtley's leadership the church seemed to progress financially as well as spiritually.

In July, 1888, the church met to call a pastor and adopt a system for raising finances for salaries and church expenses. A committee was appointed to solicit subscriptions to pay the pastor--one-fourth of said subscription to be paid in advance and the remaining three-fourths due every

successive three months. E. H. Brookshire was again called as pastor, if he could not accept, a call would be extended to Bro. J. H. Rife. If he would not accept, a third call would be made to C. M. Reed of Lancaster, all for once-a-month. The salary was to be \$120.00 for 12 months.

At the August meeting of 1888, Bro. Brookshire stated that if 12 of the bretheren would guarantee him \$120.00 and give him what he could get, he would preach, or if the church would give him \$120.00 and pay him \$100.00 the next meeting, he would take a chance on the balance.

Apparently, the chances were not good, for **Bro. J. H. Rife** made an appearance at the December meeting of 1888 and gave this reply concerning the call of the church. He stated he could preach "for the church" or "to the church", if the church wanted him, but if he preached, he wanted to preach "to the church", as he much preferred to preach "to a church" than "for a church". He requested that if anyone of the church did not mind him or was not willing to cooperate with him, he hoped they would manifest it then by rising, by proxy, or any way to express their feelings, and that he would take no exceptions at anyone so expressing themselves. He waited a moment to hear from anyone. He wanted and hoped that if there were no objections offered now, that there would be none hereafter, and that he might have the cooperation of all. After no objections were offered, Bro. Rife said he accepted the call of the church.

In order for the pastors to fulfill their responsibilities at other churches, meeting dates were often changed. The early church records reveal the church meeting once each month. Besides the usual Sunday morning service, the church met on Saturday for business, during which time the doors were opened for membership. The business meeting was preceded with a sermon by the Pastor.

Until this time, **Muldraugh Hill Church** had been affiliated with Russell Creek Association. On Saturday before the third Sunday in October, 1889, a motion and second carried that a committee be appointed to carry the letter of withdrawal from that association to the new association to convene at Bethlehem Church in Washington County, with full power to join said association or return said letter as they may think best. Bros. C. F. Putnam, B. L. Russell and J. L. Collins were appointed as said committee. This committee, at the business session of November, 1889, stated that they joined the new association under the name of Central Association of Kentucky. This church has remained in this association to the present day.

Bro. Rife refused the call for a second year because the church was unable to collect the money pledged for the pastor's salary in 1889.

In January 1890, **Bro. William Stallings** was elected by a unanimous vote to be the next pastor. Bro. Stallings stated that he did not expect to be called, because nearly the entire membership of the church were strangers to him. He said he would accept the call on condition that the church would cooperate with him in the work and make him a salary of \$120.00.

At a business meeting on Saturday before the third Sunday in May, 1891, upon the suggestion of the moderator (Bro. Wm. Stallings), it was moved and carried that the church covenant be read, and that as a means of renewing our covenant and revising our list of membership, that every member who is now and who may wish to remain members shall re-sign the covenant.

In 1892, **Muldraugh Hill Baptist Church** reported to Central Association a little advancement, but hoped to do better the coming year. They gave \$5.00 to District Missions, \$5.00 to Home

Missions, \$6.31 to Foreign Missions. There were 50 pupils enrolled in Sunday School with an average attendance of 25. The church extended a call to Bro. Stallings for the third year and upon his refusal, **Bro. J. T. Hall** became the pastor in June of 1893.

On August 7, 1897, the Central Association met with the **Muldraugh Hill Church** for the first time. There were 11 churches in the association, and they reported 1,899 members with 7 Sunday Schools.

The first mention of any trustees of the church is made during Bro. Hall's ministry here. The trustees were J. L. Collins, S. T. Harding and Porter Rafferty.

Bro. J. T. Hall was our faithful pastor until his death May 5, 1905. He was laid to rest in Brookside Cemetery, Campbellsville, Ky.

Resolutions of Repect as written by Bro. J. L. Collins adopted by the church at its regular meeting, Saturday before the fourth Sunday in August, 1903:

Resolved first that whereas it has pleased Our Great Heavenly Father who doeth all things well, to call from us to his heavenly reward, our beloved pastor and brother, Rev. J. T. Hall, who departed this life on the fifth day of May, 1903 that we deeply mourn the loss of our beloved pastor and brother and rejoin only in the promise of our Blessed Savior that he has gone to enjoy a blessed reward for a useful life well spent in the service of the true and loving God and for the glory and advancement of His cause and kingdom in this world. Resolved second that for the ten years Bro. Hall served us so faithfully as our pastor, that we knew him as a faithful, zealous minister of the gospel of Jesus. A true Christian gentleman and honest honorable and upright citizen, abounding in faith in Christ as the Saviour of sinful men and in the grace of God. Always either by precept or example exhorting his fellowman to thoughts and deeds of righteousness and usefullness. Surely his life is worth emmulation and his works will follow him. Resolved third that we deeply sympathize with his bereaved wife and children in this time of trial and sore bereavement and commend his precepts and examples to them as worthy of their greatest consideration and imitation.

Resolved fourth that it is our hearts desire and prayer to God that when our unprofitable lives of trial and sorrow shall end on earth as individuals and as the visible church of God that we may all go and-be prepared to meet our brother and Saviour together in the shining courts of Glory.

Resolved fifth that a copy of these resolutions be spread upon our records, a copy sent to the bereaved family and a copy be sent to the Western Recorder for publication.

J. W. Crawley accepted the call to be pastor of the church at the August business meeting in 1903. In September, 1904, he was assisted in a protracted meeting by Bro. Sam Crawley. Those added to the membership at this meeting were:

Lewis Ethel Jarboe Essy Hay Cora Shelton Girty Polley Willie Jacobs Dorah Newcomb Nettie Graham Arthur Colvin One of the chief items of business in early Baptist churches was the maintaining of proper behavior of its members. This was accomplished by a member reporting suspected misbehavior of another member. The accused was notified to come to church business meeting to defend himself, or confess his guilt and ask forgiveness. If the accused did not appear, a committee was appointed to visit him and report to the church. This often resulted in exclusion of the accused from the fellowship of the body. The accusations recorded in the minutes are swearing, drunkeness, fornication, adultery, dancing, "playing marbles on the Sabbath", unscriptural conduct, and failure to re-sign the covenant. The 1891 minutes of Central Association record 52 exclusions that year by erasure. However, this was unusual and perhaps not all of them were for the above mentioned reasons. Some of these were later restored to fellowship.

Church records for the period between October 1904 and August, 1923 cannot be located. Therefore, we can do little more than list the names of the pastors during that time.

Associational records indicate **Rev. T. E. Ennis** was pastor in the year 1912 through 1916. An older member recalls that he traveled by buggy and later by car from Greensburg, Ky.

The same records also show that **A. R. Abernathy** was pastor in the year of 1917, but lists no pastor for the years 1918 and 1919.



In 1920, **W. C. Hundley** became our pastor. Apparently, no church letter was sent to the association during the years 1921 through 1923. Therefore, we cannot definitely state that Bro. Hundley was pastor during this time. He does appear on the record again in 1924 as our pastor. He remained pastor until 1928.



C. L. Harmon is given as pastor from 1928 until 1929. Then **W. C. Hundley** is given as pastor again and he remained until 1932. It was under the ministry of W. C. Hundley that J. C. Raikes was licensed to preach the gospel, however, Bro. Raikes was ordained while Rev. Crit Harmon was pastor.



In 1932, L. E. Whitlow became the pastor. One of the greatest blessings the historical Committee received while working on this report was in visiting Rev. L. E. Whitlow at a Presbyterian Home for the aged at Beuchel, Ky. Although 94 years of age, he remembered vividly his years at **Muldraugh Hill**. He recalled each evangelist who served with him during revival periods. He laughingly remembered how he was showered for his efforts in the revivals with coops of chickens, half bushels of sweet potatoes (minus 2 lbs.), etc.

Bro. Whitlow told of one deacon (Bro. Farmer) who gave him half a bushel of sweet potatoes, because he didn't want to overload his car, and promised the other half bushel later. The following year when they were again in a revival, Bro. Whitlow and the evangelist visited the home of this deacon. During their visit the evangelist expressed the feeling that the revival was not progressing as it should and wondered why. Whereupon, Bro. Whitlow jokingly replied he knew the reason why. Bro. Farmer had promised him a bushel of sweet potatoes a year ago, but had only given him a half bushel and it lacked two pounds being a half bushel.

After an establishment had been built near the church door for the sale of alcoholic beverages, the church, through Bro. Whitlow's leadership, petitioned it out.

He remembered and mentioned many of the members in the six years of his ministry here. While preaching for us the second and fourth Sundays, he was also pastor of Palestine Church, preaching there the first and third Sundays of each month. He made his home at Campbellsville, Ky. Total membership as shown on the new register June 24, 1938 was 326.

Bro. Whitlow sent this reply to the church shortly after receiving an offering from us:

November 7, 1957


Dear Members:

I was surprised, and greatly humbled to receive such a generous love gift from you. It sent many precious memories rushing through my mind back to the time when you honored me with the privilege of serving as your pastor. "Brethren" I haven't the words with which to express my gratitude to you for this remembrance. Mrs. Whitlow joins me when I say, "Thank you. We covet your prayers."

For the next 14 months, beginning October, 1938, **Rev. E. M. Gash** served as pastor. Little is known about Bro. Gash other than he had a son who also was a preacher.



Within the past decade a "carbide light plant" had been installed which was somewhat an improvement over the "coal oil lamps", but an even greater improvement was made when R.E.A. lights were installed in December, 1940.

Disposing of the "carbide light plant" posed to be a problem for an entire year. The plant was advertised in both Marion and Taylor County papers which resulted in no sale. Omer Caulk was granted the right to sell the complete light plant at a price not under \$75.00. When he was unable to dispose of it at this price, an offer was made to trade a horse on the "plant." Motion and second was made for Bro. G. A. Sapp and Mance Moore to appraise the horse, which evidently was an unsatisfactory trade. The church lowered its selling price to \$60.00 and later to \$50.00. Finally in desperation the church offered the plant for sale at public auction to members of the church. Minutes of December 28, 1941 record the sale of the entire plant and building for \$71.25.

Bro. Puckett served Stewarts Creek Church in Marion County as well as **Muldraugh Hill** during 1940-1942 and resigned September 10, 1944 to accept the First Baptist Church at Jeffersontown.



October 15, 1944, the church called John T. Pierce as pastor for an indefinite period of time instead of yearly. At this time the church voted to go to full time preaching and weekly Wednesday night prayer meetings as soon as Bro. Pierce came on the field. Since he was the first full-time pastor, the church felt a need for a pastorium. The property adjoining the church was purchased from Mr. and Mrs. Robert Maupin for the sum of \$2850.00 in 1945 and was debt free by February, 1947. In a business session October 28, 1945, motion was made and seconded for the church to send a letter to the President, Representatives, and Senators to ask them to forbid alcohol of any kind to be in and around the military camps where our boys are in training. The Rev. Sam Morris of Houston, Texas, well known temperance speaker, who once spoke here, was sent a love offering of money periodically.

Our **first Bible School** was held in **1946** and has continued each year. In the same year, because of immoral practices on the church property, a fence of posts and cable were erected. Also, the monthly business meeting was changed from Sunday to Wednesday night. The next year, in order to have a more unified worship service and a better informed congregation, a bulletin service was established, however, upon the resignation of pastor, bulletins were discontinued until 1954.

Having resigned as pastor of the church, Bro. and Mrs. Pierce called for their letters to unite with the Burton Memorial Baptist Church of Bowling Green, Ky., March 27, 1947. He is most remembered for his firm stand on the use of tobacco, alcohol and catholicism.



Muldraugh Hill Baptist Church met on August 31, 1947 for the purpose of calling a pastor. **Rev. John M. Wall** was nominated and called with a unanimous vote. The church once again was extending a yearly call to her pastor. Shortly after his arrival on the field, a committee was appointed to make arrangements to start a **Training Union Program** which was finalized January 25, 1948 with **Paul Payne** as director and an enrollment of 123.

The church increased its outreach by sponsoring a **Radio Program** each Sunday morning over **W.T.C.O.** in Campbellsville, Ky. **Porter Benningfield**, **Howard Farris**, **Donald Moore**, **Robert Farmer**, **Harold Cox**, **Chester Payne**, **Mrs. Mary Parrott**, **Bertha Yates**, **Mrs. Lottie Moore**, **Dorothy Jean Farris**, **Pauline Bohannon**, **Delores Rice**, **Betty Yates**, **Joyce Maupin**, **Elizabeth Parrott** (pianist), **Lorene Hardesty**, **Lester Farmer**, **Emogene Brockman**, **Janet Farmer**, **James Robert Moore**, **Mrs. Ada Sapp**, and **Mrs. Irene Maupin** composed the radio choir. The radio program was discontinued with the resignation of Bro. Beard.



A much needed improvement of our church building at this time was Sunday School rooms. We only had curtains to divide the groups and it made it very unsatisfactory to teach and listen. Prior to this time, pastors had talked of the need for these facilities, but the church felt unable financially to build. With the leadership of Bro. Wall, interest was increased and the rooms were completed by September, 1948.

The men of the church honored Bro. Wall with a new car during his ministry here.

April 2, 1950, Bro. John W. Wall announced his resignation as pastor of **Muldraugh Hill Baptist Church** to become effective about the first or second Sunday in May.



Our eighteenth pastor was **William R. Beard** who came on the field in June of 1950. Soon after becoming our pastor he married Frances Niceley. Their oldest daughter was born while they served here.

Worship services and prayer meetings were well attended and the Sunday School broke all previous records with an attendance of 376 on a homecoming day. During seasons of revival the church would often be filled to capacity with people sitting in the aisles and around the platform of the pulpit.

Bro. Beard was instrumental in starting a building fund for the Present

house of worship and at the time the building was started, there was \$10,000.00 in the building fund.

Rev. Beard made known his resignation January 24, 1954 to become pastor of Mackville Baptist Church in Washington County.

On January 23, 1954 the "Minutes of Church Business" record reports that Muldraugh Hill Baptist Church held a special business meeting after the Evening Worship Service for the purpose of electing a pulpit committee. The following men were voted to make up the committee: **Rodger Smith, John Taylor, Leroy Feather, Steve Rice, and Chester Veatch. John Taylor** was elected chairman of the pulpit committee.



Bro. W. R. Cook succeeded Bro. Beard as pastor and was called March 17, 1954, from Younger's Creek Baptist Church in Hardin County. Bro. Cook's stay at **Muldraugh Hill** was brief, lasting only 10 months, and during his pastorate a budget system was first set up in September, 1954.



Following Bro. Cook was Rev. Kit C. Yeaste in August, 1955.

In the spring of 1947, a **Woman's Missionary Society** was organized with an enrollment of 14 and **Mrs. Bertha Yates** as President. Again the W.M.S. was reorganized on September 9, 1957 under the leadership of **Mrs. Sara Yeaste**. with 22 members. **Mrs. A. B. Colvin** helped organize and presided at this meeting. Officers elected were: **Mrs. Virgie Smith**, President; **Mrs. Bertha Yates**, First Vice President; **Mrs. Mary C. Begley**, Second Vice President and Program Chairman; **Mrs. Esther Veatch**, Community Missions; **Mrs. Sara Yeaste**, Missions Study Chairman; and **Mrs. Louise Bright**, Secretary-Treasurer. Several auxillaries have since been added:

Y.W.A (**Mrs. Richard Shields**) in March 4, 1959; and **G.A.'s** (**Mrs. Betty Meers**) in Jan., 1962. On September 29, 1974, **Carolyn Porter** and **Tammy Settles** received the adventure 3, which is equivalent of princess in the forward steps program. **Sunbeams** (**Mary Frances Veatch** and **Marie Caulk**) was organized in Jan., 1962.

Bro. Yeaste seemed to have been interested in organizing a Brotherhood, but this wasn't

realized until 1962 with **Steve Rice** as President and **Clarence Yates**, Secretary-Treasurer. The **Pioneers of the Royal Ambassadors** was organized on Wednesday night, February 28, 1962 at **Muldraugh Hill Baptist Church**. **David Veatch** was the leader with the following 8 members: **Sammie Farris**, **Mike Farris**, **Danny Farmer**, **Lonnie Moore**, **Dennis Allen**, **Jerry Smothers**, **Leon Smothers**, and **Ricky Yates**.

During these years, under the leadership of Bro. Yeaste, the people were made aware of needy people in the community. Financial aid was given to a former pastor, (Bro. Whitlow), a free will offering was taken for a man with a terminal illness, and shoes were bought for a needy family. This has been a policy of the church as far back as records exist.

After the morning worship service of December 19, 1957, Bro. Yeaste resigned to accept a pastorate at Stanford, Ky.



Rev. Richard M. Shields assumed his duties as pastor, March 19, 1958.

On October 4, 1958, a wet--dry election was the subject of much controversy in Marion County. In a bulletin dated July 6, 1958, Bro. Shields stated:

"Our church will be involved in a great way in the very near future, as the time arrives for the local option election in the city and county. I trust that you will make your stand for the cause of the right as you sign the petition to vote dry. You will speak louder than you have had the opportunity to speak for a long time and maybe even for a longer period of time."

Rallies were held at this church and throughout the county to boost support for the dry cause. The opposition, however, was just as determined and came out victorious in the campaign.

On February 4, 1959, a telephone was installed.

In order to enable more people to attend the worship services, the church purchased a bus in May, 1959 for the sum of \$175.00. The bus proved very useful during Vacation Bible School. This service continued for almost two years, when, because of the expense involved in upkeep, the church felt best to sell it. Money derived from the sale of the bus was used to buy a used piano for the basement.

On May 12, 1959, a motion and second was made to go on record to build. However, prior to this time, funds had been set aside with building in mind. A survey of the membership was made in order to determine who really wanted a new house of worship and would be willing to support it financially. A building plan was adopted similar to that of Bullitt Lick Baptist Church of Shepherdsville, Ky.. At first, a basement was not included in the plans, but was added later. The colonial style, brick sanctuary with basement and education facilities was to cost approximately \$55,000.00.

On June 10, 1959, during the Monthly Business Meeting, **Howard Farris and Edward "Boss" Benningfield** were nominated to serve as deacons. Upon their approval, a date was set for their ordination. They were ordained by **Bro. Richard Shields on June 28, 1959**.

In a business meeting of May, 1960, a motion was made to begin building as soon as contractors and materials could be secured. Serving as a building committee were: **Carl Farmer**, **Leslie Brockman**, **Edward Benningfield**, **John Taylor** and **Bro. Shields**.

In August, 1960, **Muldraugh Hill Baptist Church** broke ground for the erection of a new building. The oldest member, **Mrs. Virgie Thompson**, and youngest member, **Estelle Veatch** (**Brady**), helped **Bro. Shields** with the first shovel of dirt.

Money in the building fund was soon exhausted, and until a loan could be secured, Mr. Frank Caulk came to our assistance with a loan of \$10,000.00. Later, \$25,000.00 was secured from the Taylor County Federal Savings and Loan Association to complete the construction of the building and to repay Mr. Caulk. Within a year, the building was completed.

On Christmas Day of 1960 following the morning worship service, Bro. Richard Shields resigned as pastor to be effective January 15, 1961.

A Pulpit Committee was formed January 1, 1961.



Two months after Bro. Shields' resignation, on March 19, 1961, **Harold G. Meers** of Knox Creek Baptist Church was called as pastor. He moved to Lebanon April 13, 1961.

A typewriter and filing cabinets were purchased May 10, 1961.



The church building had not been completed when Bro. Meers became our pastor. Within a few months, however, the building was ready for use.

Dedication services were held on July 16, 1961. The dedication message was by J. Chester Badgett of the Campbellsville Baptist Church. The dedication prayer was led by the pastor and the hymn, *"Bless This House,"* was sung.

The responsive reading of the dedication was as follows:

Pastor: In recognition of our dependence upon and as an expression of our love for God the Father, the Son and the Holy Spirit, we the pastor and members of the **Muldraugh Hill Baptist Church**, here assembled on the 16th day of July, 1961

People: Acknowledge with gratitude, that is from the heart, Thy divine blessings and unerring leadership through the years.

Pastor: To the glory of God by whose favor these blessings have come to us; to the honor of Jesus, the Son of the living God, our Lord, and Saviour; to the praise of the Holy Spirit, source of light and life:

People: We do with joy and gratitude solemnly dedicate this building.

Pastor and People: We now, the people of this church dedicate this church together with all material, equipment and ourselves. We are Thine, use us and the church according to Thy Holy purpose, for Thine Own Glory. Amen.

Several improvements have been added in the years since. The public address system was installed July 17, 1968, a lighted outdoor bulletin board, walks and curbing, shrubbery, steeple, and other small items such as Baptist hymnals, chairs, cabinets, etc.

On November 8, 1961, by recommendation of the deacons, the church adopted the family night plan for the various mission organizations. Family Night was to be held on the fourth Wednesday night of each month and continues to meet at that time until this day.

Robert Smothers was ordained as deacon on April 4, 1962.

The New Market Presbyterian Church property was purchased by the church in the fall of 1962 for a sum of \$400.00. The ground was to be used as a free cemetery and the trustees were to dispose of the old church building in the most profitable manner. The church building was sold to **Charles Wright** for \$125.00 and the piano to **Howard Farris** for \$15.25.

The church assumes the responsibility of the upkeep of three cemeteries. Included in these is the cemetery across the highway which was given by a Mr. Sapp to be used as a community cemetery, and the cemetery at the site of the former New Market Baptist Church.

Following is a letter of resignation from Rev. Harold G. Meers on January 29, 1963:

To My Dear Friends in Christ, of the Muldraugh Hill Baptist Church:

It is apparent to me that God wills that I go to become pastor of the Highland Park First Baptist Church of Louisville, Ky. It is for this reason that I am resigning as pastor of this church. My last Sunday with you will be February 10, 1963.,

Our time together has been short, but it has been most rewarding for the cause of Christ. Let me make it clear, I am not leaving because any-thing is wrong here, rather, it is because most things are in good order. The reason for leaving is the call to fill the great need of the Highland Park First Church.

My heart is near many of you and this place. It is not easy to leave those we love. It is not ours alone to choose, for when God calls, His ministers must follow. I am as concerned for your welfare today as I was the day I began to work with you. My prayer is that God will lead you to a wise and able pastor.

A vote taken on March 31, 1963 resulted in the call of **E. V. Carrier** as pastor. Bro. Carrier was instrumental in helping to retire our church indebtedness. Most of the White Christmas offering, which has been a tradition for several years, was used for this purpose.

A bulletin dated March 13, 1966 states: Taylor County Loan was paid \$3,195.00 on the building debt. This brought the debt down to \$15,032.42.

As recorded in the minutes of the August 10, 1966 Business Meeting, David Veatch and James "Buddy" Moore were elected as deacons and "are to be ordained on Sunday, August 28, 1966 at 2:00 p.m. Those ordained deacons and pastors serving as council were as follows: Edward Benningfield, Steve Rice, Herbert L. Anderson, Paul Battcher, Clarence Benningfield, J. C. Riley, Clarence Harmon, Melvin C. Veatch, James Roarx, Malcolm Caulk, W. B. Hall, Howard Farris, Rev. Tim Herring, Rev. E. V. Carrier, and Rev. Herman Rowlette. The ordination was performed by Bro. E. V. Carrier.

In another bulletin dated September 22, 1968, Bro. Carrier stated:

"At the beginning of this last year, as your pastor, I said in a prayer meeting, 'If this church will support missions around the World by giving as much as 10% of our income to mission causes, God will give us a great year.""

This He has done, our receipts this year has gone beyond the \$20,000.00 and our gift to missions has been the largest in the history of the church.

We now owe the Taylor County Loan Company approximately \$2,600.00. If our offerings keep pace with the past, we are planning to have a "note burning" service on December 15, 1968.

A note burning service was held at **Muldraugh Hill Baptist Church**, Sunday morning, November 24, 1968, after paying the church debt. In seven years, the church was able to pay a \$22,000.00 note plus interest. The church trustees had negotiated seven years ago with the Taylor County First Federal Savings and Loan Association of Campbellsville for a \$22,000.00 note that was to be paid within 14 years.

"Since the building of the church, the budget has steadily grown until now the budget has reached the \$20,000 a year outlay for local and mission work," said the Rev. E. V. Carrier, who recently resigned his pastorate at the church.

November 24, 1968 was the last Sunday of the pastorate for Bro. Carrier, who now is pastor of the Immanuel Baptist Church in Elizabethtown, Kentucky.



L. D. Kennedy of Campbellsville College served as interim pastor three months before our present pastor, **Rev. R. B. Hullette** came on the field, March 7, 1969.

The church in a called business session, August 24, 1969, on a Sunday morning, voted by a 64 standing vote and none in opposition to proceed with breaking ground for a **new pastorium**. The planning and building committee consisted of **Lester Farmer**, **Raymond England**, **Edward Benningfield**, **Sarah Brockman**, and **Betty Graham**.

On October 14, 1969 the contract was let to G. W. Barnes, Campbellsville, Kentucky. Work began October 18th on the excavation of the basement. The new home (28 feet 8 inches x 74 feet, 8 inches) consists of a full size walk-out basement, two car garage, den, kitchen, dining room, living room, three bedrooms (one with adjoining bath) and a central bath facility. The cost was to be around \$25,000. Harry B. Thompson was the architect and upon completion of the pastorium, the Hullette family moved October 5, 1970.

The former pastorium which stood near the front of the present one was purchased by Lambert Livers March 21, 1970 at a cost of \$725.00. The building was moved intact to Mr. Livers' property which adjoins the church property.

Plans were discussed at length at a June, 1973 business meeting for replacing the steeple which had been destroyed by wind May 23rd of the same year. The steeple decided on at this meeting was one with a cross on top and one from which the bell of the former church building could be installed. This bell was purchased and erected for the first time in 1925 by Mr. James Farmer. The present steeple was erected October 1, 1973 by Aluminum Manufacturing Company of Greensburg, Kentucky costing \$3500.00 of which \$1131.06 was derived from insurance.

The church being without a song leader, after **Jerry Smothers**, who held this position, moved, felt someone outside the church could better fill this vacancy. **David Forman** of Campbellsville, Kentucky was elected and presently fills this position.

Until 1930, a pump organ was used to accompany the congregational singing. This was the first mention of a piano in the records. In the years following, the church brought a new piano and electric organ which are in use today.

The church history includes documentation of the Church Membership and Sunday School Enrollment from 1875 to 1973.

Under the leadership of the Holy Spirit, five men from our church have been licensed to preach and four of them ordained: J. C. Raikes, Roy Houston, Paul Payne, Chester Veatch, and J. W. Farmer.

- J. C. Raikes, son of Mr. and Mrs. Perry J. Raikes was born in Bradfordsville, Kentucky on August 10, 1908. He has four sisters, Mrs. Gene (Artie) Taylor; Mrs. Verlin (Florrie) Samples; Mrs. Damien (Estelle) Benningfield; Mrs. Paul (Juanita) Payne; one halfsister, 'Mrs. Tony (Barbara) Rodrigues, and a sister, Nancy, who died in 1928. He also has three brothers, Claude, Gilbert, and Eugene, who died in 1963, also two half-brothers, David and Phillip Raikes. He is married to Virginia Moore Raikes. They have one son, Glen Raikes who resides at Morehead, Kentucky. He professed faith in the Lord in autumn of 1926. He graduated from Lebanon High School; Georgetown College, Georgetown, Kentucky, and the Southern Baptist Theological Seminary in Louisville, Kentucky. Before entering the ministry, he served nine years as teacher and administrator in the public school system of Marion County, Kentucky. He announced his call to the gospel ministry, was licensed to preach in 1927 and was ordained by Muldraugh Hill **Baptist Church**, Lebanon, Kentucky on September 22, 1928. He was pastor of the Willisburg Baptist Church, Willisburg, Kentucky; Magnolia Baptist Church, Magnolia, Kentucky; Weaver Memorial Baptist Church, Louisville, Kentucky; First Baptist Church, Morehead, Kentucky; and Dayton Avenue Baptist Church, Xenia, Ohio. He is retired from active pastorate as of September 30, 1973 and is presently serving as interim pastor of Bellview Baptist Church, Bellbrook, Ohio. He has been active in this denominational life during his 36 years as pastor; serving as Moderator of Associations; as member of Executive Board of State Conventions of Kentucky and Ohio; served as member of Board of Child Care; Kentucky Baptist State Convention for number of years; served as Trustee of Midwestern Baptist Theological Seminary, Kansas City, Missouri, and toured the Bible lands and Greece in 1972.
- Roy Edward Houston, son of the late George M. and Nellie Burnett Houston was born in Marion County, Lebanon, Kentucky, December 19, 1919. He attended grade and high school in Marion County, graduated from Campbellsville College in 1947 and Louisville Seminary in Louisville, Kentucky in 1949. He was married to Roberta Thompson March 29, 1937, who was fatally injured in an automobile accident near Rome, Georgia, February 12, 1966.

Rev. and Mrs. Houston had five children, R. E., Fitzy, Ben, Imogene, and Betty. About five years prior to Mrs. Houston's death, Reverend Roy Houston passed away of a fatal heart attack June 22, 1961, after suffering a first, one hour earlier while attending a Sunday School clinic at Forsyth, Georgia. He was baptized in 1930. He pastored the Salem and Friendship Baptist Church, Salem, Kentucky for three years, Gethsemane Baptist Church in Danville, Kentucky four years before going to First Baptist Church in Trion, Georgia. Roy and Roberta moved their membership to Salem Baptist Church in July 1946. It was this church which requested his ordination which was held November 28, 1945. For almost a decade, he was pastor of the First Baptist Church, Trion, Georgia. While serving as pastor there, the First Baptist Church building burned on November 25, 1956.

Reverend Houston led the church in making plans for its replacement. Bro. Houston expressed his appreciation for our concern with this letter:

"I have never been so wordless in my life as I am in trying to express my feelings in this letter. We have received many donations from our friends and from churches around our community, but no gift has ever meant so much as the gift from my home church. Please express to the church my personal appreciation and the appreciation from the church here for this gift. I am deeply touched and I feel that it is an expression of love. I love your people and am happy that you are doing a great work there."

Roy Houston

Bro. Houston had one brother, Robert A. Houston; five sisters, Mrs. Omer (Lyda) Caulk, Mrs. Ethel Bohanon, Mrs. Robert (Thelma) Gowan, Mrs. Steve (Elsie) Rice and Mrs. Hall (Lillie) Newcomb. The latter two are members of our church now.

• **Paul Payne**, son of Will and Mary Payne was born in Marion County, Kentucky on July 28, 1923. He has seven brothers, Howard, Lyle, Gerald, Joe, Marion, Chester, and Ronnie Payne; two sisters, Mrs. O. R. (Edith) Perkins, and Mrs. Helen Mattingly. He is married to Juanita Raikes Payne. They have one daughter, Mrs. Shelby (Mary Alice) Payne who also resides in Ohio.

He professed faith in the Lord on July 5, 1936 and was baptized into the fellowship of **Muldraugh Hill Baptist Church** on November 11, 1936. He attended Marion County Grade Schools, received B. A. At Georgetown College in 1952, and Master of Divinity, Southern Baptist Theological Seminary in 1956. Before entering the ministry, he was a foreman at L & N Railroad, served two years as a Paratrooper in World War II, and was a farmer at the time he surrendered to preach. He surrendered to the call to preach on August 15, 1948. He was licensed November 28, 1948 and Ordained June 19, 1949 by **Muldraugh Hill Baptist Church**. He has pastored at the Friendship Baptist Church, Casey County, Kentucky; Ottawa Baptist Church, Rockcastle, Kentucky; Blue Ash Baptist Church, Cincinnati, Ohio; First Baptist Church, Miamisburg, Ohio; and First Baptist Church, Huber Heights, Dayton, Ohio where he is presently serving.

He also served seven years as Director of Missions under The Home Mission Board in Dayton, Ohio, has served as a member of the Executive Board of Kentucky Baptists, member of the Executive Board of Baptists in Ohio, member of the Executive Committee of The Southern Baptist Convention, served as First Vice President of Ohio Baptists, and is presently serving second term as a Member of the Foreign Mission Board of The Southern Baptist Convention. He made a preaching tour of England in 1964 and also a tour of the Middle East, including Israel in 1971.

• John Wesley Farmer, son of Mr. and Mrs. Alvin Farmer, was born in Taylor County on January 20, 1925. He has three sisters, Esther, Frances, and Ruth. The latter is a member of our church now. He is married to Edna Bernice Jarboe Farmer and they have two children, a son, Lynn Edward, and a daughter, Karen Gay.

He graduated from Taylor County, Campbellsville College, Georgetown College, and also received Master of Divinity from Southern Baptist Theological Seminary, Louisville, Kentucky. He was engaged in farming in Taylor County before entering the ministry.

He professed faith in Christ in September 1936 at **Muldraugh Hill Baptist Church**, was called to preach when he was a teenager, but surrendered to the call in August 1948, and was ordained December 8, 1949 at South Campbellsville Baptist Church, Campbellsville, Kentucky. He has pastored Pikes Ridge 1949-1952 Taylor County; Walnut Hill now Lowell Avenue 1952-1954 Campbellsville, Menlo 1954-1957 Menlo, Georgia; Buice

Memorial 1957-1959 Atlanta, Georgia; Superintendent of Missions 1959-1963 Bedford, Kentucky, Little Union 1963-1966 Fairfield, Kentucky; First Baptist Church 1966-1973 Irvine, Kentucky and is presently serving First Baptist Church, Carrollton, Kentucky. He served in the armed forces of our country for two years (1945 and 1946). Thirteen months was on Okinawa. He made a tour around the world June 20, 1970-July 20, 1970, visiting 15 countries. He also visited 49 states in our nation and preached revivals in Alabama, Georgia, California, Missouri, and Kentucky.

PASTOR'S COMMENT:

The pastor deeply appreciates the many hours of research and writing of our church history. Our history committee: **Mrs. Edward Benningfield**, **Mrs. Jesse Maupin** and **Mrs. Lester Farmer** are to be complimented for a thorough and interesting history.

I am grateful also to be pastor of a church where her members are not only rich in historical data, but rich in love, understanding, cooperation and fellowship.

In celebrating a hundred years as an organized church, one becomes involved with the thrill of a small band of people seeking for a place and creating an atmosphere for worship. One finds himself joining with the congregation in singing, praying and listening to the thundering messages of pastors--messages on God's grace, judgment, condemnation upon sin and other great doctrines of the faith. These men of God preached unflinchingly against unchristian conduct and led the church to reinforce their messages by taking immediate action to discipline her members. Many times the services began or ended in long sessions of church business.

The history, decade by decade moves along from organization with charter members and their.descendents joined by hundreds of other members uniting in one faith and purpose. *Muldraugh Hill Baptist Church* has experienced periods of physical and spiritual depressions, but always followed by revival and victory.

Under the leadership of various pastors, the members of the church have cooperated and progressed toward better organization and facilities for Sunday School and Church. The church has consistantly maintained interest in worldwide missions through missionary organizations and contributions through the Cooperative Program.

The church has demonstrated a greater understanding of a pastor's role and has provided a beautiful and adequate home and better financial assistance for his needs.

Whatever progress has been made has resulted in part by members of this church who sacrifically gave of themselves in the Lord's work. Many of these have gone to be with the Lord.

May the same pioneer spirit and promptings of heart unite us in continual zeal and fellowship as we make history "Looking for that blessed hope, and the glorious appearing of the great God and our Saviour Jesus Christ." Titus 2:13

The History Of MULDRAUGH HILL BAPTIST CHURCH (October, 1974--October, 1984)

Muldraugh Hill Baptist Church celebrated its Centennial Anniversary with a week-long revival from Oct. 21-Oct. 27, 1974. The speakers for each night were as follows:

- Monday (Bro. L.D. Kennedy)
- Tuesday (Bro. W.R. Beard, a former pastor)
- Wednesday (Bro. Hicks Shelton)
- Thursday (Bro. Paul Payne, ordained by this church)
- Friday (Bro. E.V. Carrier, a former pastor)
- Saturday (Bro. J.W. Wall, a former pastor)
 - This was old-fashioned night with old-fashioned dress and lanterns and lamps lighting the sanctuary)
- Sunday-Bro. Richard M. Shields a former pastor

Sunday morning services were followed by "dinner on the grounds" at noon and entertainment that afternoon by the Journeymen Quartet and a closing message delivered by Bro J.C. Raikes, who was ordained by this church.

513 people signed the guest register that week and there were probably several that attended services and failed to sign the register.

At the close of his message on Sunday morning (November 17, 1974), Bro. Bruce Hullette read his letter of resignation to the Church. The resignation was effective Dec. 8, 1974. He had accepted a call to Surgoinsville Baptist Church in Surgoinsville, Tennessee, where he had been pastor previously and where he is pastor at this time.

The telephone was made a private line on February 5, 1975.

Bro. Gene Hall served as interim pastor, substituted once by Bro. Carrier and once by Bro. Ken Forman (father of our Music Director, **Dave Forman**)



Following the Sunday morning services on April 13, 1975, the church was called to order for the business of voting, by secret ballot, on <u>Bro. Earl Pike</u> as Pastor. The results were 159 for and 16 opposed. A unanimous standing vote was also given in favor of Bro. Pike and an announcement was made at the evening services that he had accepted..

The Pike family moved to the pastorium on Monday, May 5, 1975 and he assumed the pastorate on June 1, 1975.

On June 8, 1975, our Music Director, David Forman, submitted his resignation to become effective June-15, 1975.

In a special called business meeting on Sunday morning (June 22, 1975), the church voted to install air condition in the church building.

On August 6, 1975, at regular business meeting, a committee composed of **Mary C. Begley**, **Ruth Farmer**, **Carroll Taylor**, **Albert Smothers**, and **Theresa Feather** were appointed to draw up a constitution and by-laws. A copy of the complete document was distributed to each church family on Sunday, Sept. 27, 1975.

Buddy Moore resigned as deacon on September 7, 1975.

On Sept.28, 1975, at a called business meeting, the church voted, upon the recommendation of the music committee, to call **Larry Brandenburg** as our full time Music Director.

At the conclusion of this church year (October, 1974--Sept., 1975), the number of new members added were 6 (by letter) and the following members were recorded as deaths:

- Leonard Moberley (Nov. 1, 1974)
- Mrs. Harlan "Christine" Farmer (Feb. 1.5, 1975)
- H.G. Disney (July 6, 1975)
- Leonard Sapp (September, 1975)
- Ezra Colvin (Sept. 4, 1975)
- James. H. Smith (Sept. 210, 1975)

On Nov. 12, 1975, at regular business meeting, the church voted to hire **Gloria Mattingly** as church secretary for one day per week. On this date it was also decided to install aluminum siding and guttering at a cost of \$1261.00 instead of painting the church's exterior trim. Also it was determined that there should be one deacon for every fifty residents and a rotation list of deacons was started.

Hubie Graham, Ernest Carol Taylor, and Clarence Yates were ordained as deacons by Bro. Carrier on January 25, 1976.

On April 7, 1976, the church voted to purchase a small tract of land containing approximately 3 acres from **Mrs.Theresa Feather** and **Felix Cooper** at a cost of \$4300.00.

On April 21, 1976, at a called business meeting, the church voted to purchase a tract of land containing approximately one and one-half to one and three-fourths acre from Mr. and Mrs. Lambert Livers at a cost of \$5000.00. Earl Brockman, Lester Farmer and Marion Payne

cleared this newly acquired land for a recreational area.

On May 30, 1976, we had a Homecoming celebration and note-burning, which ended indebtedness on the parsonage.

A new typewriter was purchased in August 1976.

An Evangelistic Crusade was held from Aug. 22-29, 1976, composed of 27 churches of different denominations from Marion and Washington Counties. It was held at the Marion County High School Football Stadium each night at 8 o'clock. Bro. Wayne Bristow of Lubbock, Texas was the evangelist.

At the conclusion of the church year (October, 1975-September, 1976), the Deceased members recorded were:

• Harlan Farmer (Feb. 8, 1976)

J.E. Settles and Raymond England were nominated and approved to be deacons on September 15, 1976. They were ordained by Bro. Earl Pike on October 3, 1976.

On Oct. 6, 1976, it was noted that the Church Secretary, **Gloria Mattingly**, has secured fulltime employment elsewhere and could no longer hold the position of secretary. **Debbie Farris** was hired for this position, which she now holds.

On April 10, 1977, **Larry Brandenburg** tendered his resignation as Music Director to accept a similar position at Hodgensville Baptist Church.

On April 17, 1977, **Bro. Pike** addressed the congregation after morning worship services regarding his desire to acquire a church bus. Pledges were called for and more than enough money was realized to purchase the used bus. The initial cost of the bus was \$700.00 plus the additional costs of license, title, tires, painting, and insurance amounted to \$1600.00. The bus is still in service and has covered many, many miles since the time of purchase.

On May 4, 1977, the decision was made to pave the parking area of the church grounds (3,537 sq. yd at \$2.65.per sq. yd.) totaling \$9,373.05 plus the cost of preparation for paving (filling in with rock). The paving was completed by July 13, 1977. It was also decided at this meeting to erect a plank fence surrounding the church grounds. It was also reported at this meeting that .3 acre of ground had been given to the church to complete the recreational area.

At the conclusion of this church year (Oct. 1, 1976--Sept., 1977), the number of new members added were 8 (by baptism) and 8 (by letter). The members recorded as deceased were:

According to the minutes of monthly business meeting in October, 1977, no attendance record was listed for Training Union, so we assume that as of **October**, 1977, **Training Union was discontinued.**

During the week of June 23-July 2, 1978, **The Stalneckers** conducted revival services here with their music, preaching, and activities for the youth. They traveled in a bus which furnished their living quarters. The group included Ed and Bette Stalnecker, their 2 sons and wives, and 1 grandchild. At that time, they had traveled to over 600 Southern Baptist Churches from First Baptist Church in Key West, Fla. to First Baptist Church in Anchorage, Alaska.

A special called business meeting was held on July 2, 1978 in which the church decided to purchase the organ (which we now use) from the Stalneckers at a cost of \$2600.00.

On July 12, 1978, the church voted to amend by-laws, Article VI, Section 3 concerning the selection and rotation system of deacons.

At the conclusion of this church year (October, 1977-Sept., 1978), the number of new members added were 14 (by baptism) and 10 (by letter). Those members recorded as deceased were:

- Arthur "Jip" Hardesty (Oct. 19, 1977)
- Annie Bright (March 3, 1978)
- Omer Wise (May 28, 1978)
- Leslie Brockman (July 12, 1978)

On Oct. 4, 1978, Gary Vidito was called as Minister of Music

A special business meeting was called for Jan. 17, 1979, at which time the decision was made to renovate the parsonage by enclosing the garage to make a den, adding a fireplace and carport.

At the conclusion of this church year (October, 1978--Sept., 1979), the number of new members added were 6 (by baptism) and 15 (by letter). The members recorded as deceased were:

On July 6, 1980, **Bro. Pike** submitted his resignation and Sunday, July 20, 1980 was Bro. Pike's last sermon here as pastor.

Bro. Charles VanZant, who was a member of our church, served as interim pastor.

At the conclusion of this church year (October, 1979--Sept., 1980), the number of new members added were 12 (by baptism). Those members recorded as deceased were:

- Frank D. Jacobs (Sept, 23, 1979)
- Leona Watson (March, 1980)
- Shelby Wise (Aug., 1980)



On Oct. 5, 1980, **Bro. Victor Stansbury** came for a trial sermon. On Oct. 8, 1980, the pulpit committee made a recommendation to the church to call **Bro. Stansbury** as pastor. On Sunday, Oct. 12, 1980 the congregation voted by secret ballot of 150 "yes" and 3 "no" votes to call him as our pastor. His first sermon as our pastor was Nov. 30, 1980.

On April 26, 1981, **Gary Vidito** submitted his resignation as Music Director effective May 24, 1981.

On July 8, 1981, the church voted for the construction of a ramp and the renovation of the front steps to be done by Bradley Hoosier at a cost of \$3000.00.

On July 26, 1981, Bro. Stansbury was pleasantly surprised upon arriving home from vacation to find 2 new air conditioners installed in the parsonage at a cost of \$1030.00.

On Sept.9, 1981, the church voted to call **Nick Szymansky** as Music and Youth Director. Shortly thereafter, **Marty Szymansky**, wife of our Music and Youth Director, started **Mission Friends** for the preschoolers of our church. Mission Friends are still meeting on Sunday nights during worship service.

At the conclusion of the church year (October, 1980--Sept., 1981), the number of new members added were 3 (by baptism) and 9 (by letter). Those members recorded as deceased were:

- Winfred "Tink" Brockman (Jan. 1. 1981)
- Gilbert Brockman

March 18-21, 1982---World Missions Conference preceeded by study course each night. Speakers included:

On Oct. 6, 1982, the church voted to buy the piano, which is presently being used in the basement, from **Wanda Buckler** at a cost of \$400.00.

On November, 1982, Nick Szymansky, our Minister of Music and Youth, resigned.

In a special called business meeting on August 7, 1983, it was decided to call **Jerry Noble** as Minister of Music and Youth.

At the conclusion of the church year (October, 1982--Sept., 1983), the number of members added to the church were 3 (by baptism) and 9 (by letter). Those members recorded as deceased were:

- Mrs.Frank "Margaret" O'Gorman (Dec. 13, 1982)
- Ella Yates (July, 1983)
- Sudie Sapp (July, 1983)

In May, 1984, Jerry Noble resigned as Minister of Music and Youth.

On July 1, 1984, the church voted to call **Don Hamlin** as Minister of Music and Youth. During the times that we were without a Minister of Music, **J.E. Settles** served as the Music Director and **Danny England** worked with the youth when the Youth Directors resigned.

At the conclusion of the church year (October, 1983---Sept., 1984), the number of new members added to the church were 7 (by baptism) and 5 (by letter). Those members recorded as deceased were:

- Edward Wise (Qct.1,1983)
- Deward Cox (Oct. 5, 1983)
- Elsie Disney (Dec. 5, 1983)
- William Lee "Bill" Moore (Jan. 1, 1984)

- Samuel Watson (Sept. 25, 1984)

The main source of material for this summary of the last 10 years was the minutes of the business meetings recorded for those years. Many other events and activities were accomplished that were not mentioned in the minutes, but due to lack of time, the History Committee was unable to research the dates of these happenings.

Some things recalled by the Committee were:

- 1. Renovation of the church kitchen
- 2. A new copy machine for the church office which is now paid for in full as of Sept., 1984.
- 3. New Communion Chairs, given by an anonymous donor and made by Tommy Buckler, a church member.
- 4. Published a monthly church newsletter, the Sunday School Gazette, along with a monthly calendar of birthdays and anniversaries
- 5. Recreation Committee was formed to plan activities and trips for the church
- 6. Annual Maundy Thursday services on the Thursday before Easter fellowship meal followed by candlelight services and observance of the Lord's Supper
- 7. Christmas caroling to the shut-ins

8. Annual Christmas Eve Services

On Oct. 14, 1984, the church will have its 110th anniversary celebration with old-fashioned dress and a meal served after morning worship service. The youth of the church plan to bury a time capsule behind the church containing items that are relevent to our church and community today. Films of past church functions will be shown in the afternoon.

The History Committee plans, within the next few weeks to compile a more detailed account of the past 10 years, which will be available in booklet form for each church family.

The History Of MULDRAUGH HILL BAPTIST CHURCH (1984-1999)

Barbara Jean Benningfield, Elizabeth Farmer, Emogene Farmer, and **Joyce Payne** compiled the history of **Muldraugh Hill Baptist Church** from **1984 to 1999**. Much appreciation goes to these ladies who spent many hours gathering information from church and associational minutes, church records and bulletins, and individual sources. Although much time was required, the ladies reported that they enjoyed reminiscing about the many activities occurring in the history of **Muldraugh Hill Baptist Church**.

The following amendment to the Constitution and By-Laws pertaining to the election of deacons was approved on October 10, 1984.

Amendment to our By-Laws ARTICLE VI, Section 3 of the Constitution

Section 3. Deacons

(1) There may be one deacon for every fifty resident members whose names are on the church roll until a maximum of fifty deacons is reached. The deacon shall serve on a three year rotation system, based on our fiscal year, after which, he must be inactive one year before being chosen again. The recommendation of men for deaconship to be activated into active service shall be made by the nominating committee. The primary guide for the Church as to the men who are qualified will be 1 Timothy 3:8-12, Acts 6:1-7, and Titus. The qualifications for deaconship shall be read by the pastor after which asking God's guidance in prayer. Each member of the nominating committee shall have before him/her a list containing the names of all men in membership of the Church. The pastor will read from the list, asking them to give prayerful consideration to each, and to decide together upon the men, in their judgment, that are the most qualified for deaconship. When they decide, the men needed shall be contacted and asked if they are willing to serve, if so, they will be presented to the Church along with all the other teachers and officers recommended by the nominating committee.

During the church year of 1985, there were 7 additions by baptism and letter; the Sunday School Attendance average was 162; and the recorded deaths were:

During 1986, with a majority vote, the decision was made to renovate the sanctuary as follows:

- Install oak paneling across the front, behind the piano, organ, and pulpit area.
- Carpet the entire sanctuary, the hall in back of sanctuary, and all the stairs.
- Install new floor covering on the floor of the vestibule.
- Install padded covering on pews.
- The renovation cost was not to exceed \$22,000. The actual cost was \$19,544.99.

During Business session conducted on July 8, 1986, recognition was given to **Charles Glenn Wright**, who has surrendered to the ministry and has given evidence that God has called him by preaching for us. Through the vote taken, approval was given for Glenn to be issued a certificate of license to preach.

We learned on June 10, 1987, that Charles Glenn Wright had been called as pastor of the Brush Grove Baptist Church located in the Central Association. The ordination service for Charles Glenn Wright was held on June 21, 1987.

On August 6, 1986, the Church voted to issue a certificate of license to **Charles E. Hamlin**, who has surrendered to God's call into the ministry.

During the church year of 1986, there were 11 additions by baptism and letter; the Sunday School Attendance average was 179; and the recorded deaths were:

Burnam and Anita Lanham were hired to clean the church on April 8, 1987.

According to the minutes of the business meeting conducted on June 10, 1987, the members present were surprised as they experienced the shock of a moderate earthquake while the financial report was being read.

A new roof was installed on the church building during 1987.

There has been some concern among the membership regarding ownership of the cemetery across the road from the church building. The deacons contacted John Smith, a local attorney, who was asked to research and investigate the matter. During business meeting on June 10, 1988, the deacons reported that Mr. Smith had researched the court records and found a deed dated

December 6, 1874, stating that a 1.5 acre tract in front of the Baptist Church has been conveyed to the trustees on **Muldraugh Hill Baptist Church** to be held by them as a public cemetery. (The 1974 deed is a record of the transfer of property from Citizens National Bank, executor of the will of Samuel Cooper, to Teresa Feather and Felix Cooper. That deed for slightly more than 56 acres shows an exception of that conveyance of a 1 1/2 acre tract in front of **Muldraugh Hill Baptist Church** which has been conveyed to the trustees of **Muldraugh Hill Baptist Church** to be held by them as a public cemetery.) Other deeds and records indicate that the property was deeded to the trustees sometime between 1897 and 1917.

During the church year of 1987, there were 5 additions by baptism and letter; the Sunday School Attendance average was 173; and the recorded deaths were:

On May 15, 1988, Steve Skaggs was called as minister of music and youth. He began to serve in this capacity on June 12, 1988.

Also in 1988, the Church voted to enter into an agreement with the Annuity Board of the Southern Baptist Convention to pay \$210 per year for the pastor's retirement plan with no additional cost to the Church.

On August 21, 1988, a special offering was taken after the worship service to be sent to the "Citizens Against State Lottery," to help them in their television, newspaper, and other areas of advertisement against the lottery.

The Church purchased a reconditioned commercial stove for the kitchen.

The Church voted to approve a proposal presented by the deacons to change Sections 6 and 12 of the Constitution and By-Laws to be amended so that the stewardship committee be nominated by the deacons at the same time as the nominating committee and that the secretary-treasurer become a permanent member of the stewardship committee.

During the church year of 1988, there were 18 additions by baptism and letter; the Sunday School Attendance average was 175; and the recorded deaths were:

During 1989, there was a recognized need for new hymnals. The music committee was given the authority to purchase the number of books needed when the new edition is published. The edition is expected to be available in 1991. Members were given an opportunity to purchase hymnals for the Church in honor of or in memory of friends, relatives, or loved ones. Three hundred copies of

The New Baptist Hymnal were purchased in 1991.

A love offering and \$500 from the treasury was provided for **Steve and Shirley Skaggs** toward expenses for a trip to Europe.

More than 100 meals were served for the senior citizens meal provided by the deacons and their wives on July 29, 1989.

A major purchase made in 1989, was a Grand piano for the sanctuary. The piano was used for the first time during the annual fall meeting of the Central Association held at the **Muldraugh Hill Baptist Church** on October 3, 1989. The cost of the piano was \$8,900.

During the church year of 1989, there were 14 additions by baptism and letter; the Sunday School Attendance average was 169; and the recorded deaths were:

Benny Battcher was nominated as a deacon by Billie Veatch and it was seconded by Howard Farris on **January 10, 1990**. Upon his approval he was ordained by **Bro. Vic Stansbury** sometime before March 14, 1990 when it was mentioned in the minutes.

During 1990, the church building and the pastorium were connected to the water line providing water from the Marion County Water District. A new vacuum cleaner, TV and VCR were purchased. Video tapes were also acquired to begin a video tape library for check-out.

During the church year of 1990, there were 12 additions by baptism and letter; the Sunday School Attendance average was 177; and the recorded deaths were:

During 1991, new American and Christian flags were purchased for the sanctuary. **Steve Skaggs** resigned after 2 1/2 years as director of music and youth. **Darrin Jenkins** served as interim director for music and youth.

Improvements for the building and grounds included new guttering for the church building, construction of the basketball court, and resurfacing of the parking lot.

During the church year of 1991, there were 6 additions by baptism and letter; the Sunday School Attendance average was 173; and the recorded deaths were:

Many felt that the acoustics in the sanctuary were not satisfactory. Therefore, in February of 1992, the Church voted to name a committee to check into the possibilities of installing a sound system. After many contacts, the sound system was installed in 1995.

The Church decided on August 26, 1992, to replace the air conditioning system in the sanctuary and basement. The bid was awarded to Custom Air of Danville, Kentucky for a cost of \$13,985.

During the church year of 1992, there were 19 additions by baptism and letter; the Sunday School Attendance average was 165; and the recorded deaths were:

A new program designed for children ages 2-prekindergarten began in 1993. This program gives children an opportunity to attend **Children's Church** in the basement following the children's sermon in the sanctuary. **Linda Taylor** volunteered to be the director of the program. As of this date (1999), **Wanda Farris** and **Bonnie Benningfield** are coordinating the program.

During the church year of 1993, there were 10 additions by baptism and letter; the Sunday School Attendance average was 167; and the recorded deaths were:

In response to a recommendation from the deacons, the church voted on October 6, 1993, to send the pastor, and his wife, Joan Stansbury, on a trip to the Holy Land. The trip was scheduled for December 27, 1993 to January 4, 1994 at a cost of \$4,820.

Now that the church building and pastorium are connected to the Marion County Water line, there is no longer a need for the cistern which had been the source of water. The members were informed on November 10, 1993 that the cistern had been filled and the ground sealed.

The Church voted on August 10, 1994, to replace the columns on the front entrance of the building. On November 9, 1994, the members were informed that the columns had been replaced by All Seasons Aluminum Company of Campbellsville, Kentucky at a cost of \$716.56.

During the church year of 1994, there were 11 additions by baptism and letter; the Sunday School Attendance average was 160; and the recorded deaths were:

There are many good cooks among the ladies of Muldraugh Hill Baptist Church. In order to share their recipes and pass them on to future generations, there have been two cookbooks published. After much discussion and a survey regarding transportation needs, the Church voted on March 8, 1995 to buy a van.

On March 10, 1996, picture sessions began for the 3rd Church Directory.

In 1984 and 1987, **Muldraugh Hill Baptist Church** was involved in a movement against the sale of alcoholic beverages and the establishment of additional night clubs on U.S. 68 (new road close to county line). Church members were also active in a wet/dry election for the Jessetown precinct which was voted "dry" on December 15, 1987.

On November 4, 1992, the deacons recommended that we prepare a petition against violence on television during prime time to send to the FCC and to our Senators and Representatives. We also decided to send a copy to the Western Recorder and to take a copy to the Central Association asking other churches to do the same.

During the church year of 1996, there were 14 additions by baptism and letter; the Sunday School Attendance average was 159; and the recorded deaths were:

On May 8, 1996, the deacons recommended the Constitution and By-Laws committee meet and set up a cemetery committee with guidelines to oversee the administration of the cemeteries belonging to the Church and the cemetery fund. The following amendment was presented on July 10, 1996. The second reading and approval was given on August 7, 1996.

Article VII Committees (New Section) Section 14 Cemetery Committee

This commitee of three shall have the responsibility of administering funds received and/or generated for the purpose of caring for church cemeteries. Teh members are to be elected for a three year term on a staggered basis. In order that this may be accomplished, the original committee will consist of one member who will serve a one year term. Thereafter, each member shall be elected for a three year term. The committee shall administer the funds to effectively maintain the cemeteries as appropriated by the church for up-keep of the cemeteries until the cemetery fund reaches \$30,000. When the cemetery fund reaches \$30,000, the committee shall administer funds generated through interest to maintain the cemeteries.

Changes within the Southern Baptist Convention and the dates of publication of literature for Sunday School Bible Study necessitated **change of the church calendar year from (October 1 through September 30) to (September 1 through August 31)**. The church fiscal year will now follow the calendar year, (January 1 to December 31).

The antique chairs kept from the old (1874) church building have been restored by one of our members, **Goldie Graham**, and are now used in the sanctuary.

The job description for **Minister of Music and Youth** has now been separated into **two positions** with one position for **Minister of Music** and another one for **Minister of Youth**.

During 1999, the women of the Church had an opportunity to participate in the Bible Study, *A Woman's Heart, God's Dwelling Place* by Beth Moore.

The following amendment to the Constitution and By-Laws was approved on January 6, 1999.

Article VII

Section 1

All church committees shall be recommended by the nominating committee and elected by the church unless otherwise indicated in the description below. The committee members shall be elected each year. After being elected, the committee members of each committee shall be called together to elect their officers and organize for the consideration of problems related to work. Each committee shall report the action to the second business meeting following the election of its members. The following committees shall be elected.

On June 9, 1999, the Church voted to accept a recommendation to open a brokerage account with Edward L. Jones in Lebanon, Kentucky. This fund was established to enable individuals to transfer stocks, bonds, and securities to the Church as gifts.

Reverend Victor Stansbury, Pastor, has been a member of our Church family since 1980. Rev. Stansbury is active in many community affairs, the ministerial association, the Central Association, Campbellsville University, and supports many activities for better family and community life for Marion County and Taylor County residents.

Darrin Jenkins was called to be the Minister of Music on Sunday, July 18, 1999.

During the absence of a Youth Director and presently, **Steve Yates** serves to coordinate activities for the youth.

Building Program (1992-1999)

For many years, members of **Muldraugh Hill Baptist Church** have had the opportunity to contribute to a building fund. This fund was established by a stewardship committee who felt that the time would come when we would need more space and additional facilities. On April 8, 1992, the deacons recommended a building steering committee be nominated. The following were approved to serve on the committee: **Roger Barnett**, **David England**, **Joyce Payne**, **Billy Veatch**, and **Betty Whitehouse**.

On February 10, 1993, the building steering committee requested and received approval for an expenditure of up to \$250, for an on-site consultation and possible sketches and plan reviews for future building needs from the Southern Baptist Sunday School Board Architecture Department.

Using the results of a survey regarding the desires of church members and the comments and suggestions coming from the Southern Baptist Sunday School Board Architecture Department, On October 4, 1995, the building steering committee presented some ideas for building and requested approval to contact an architect to complete some preliminary drawings. Approval was given for up to \$1000 for drawings.

On Sunday, January 14, 1996, there was a special called business meeting to vote on the recommendations coming from the steering committee. A "yes" vote being a vote to build and a "no" vote being a vote not to build. Vote was by secret ballot. When the ballots were counted, there were 86 "yes" votes and 76 "no" votes.

Muldraugh Hill Baptist Church December 10, 1995

In accordance with the Constitution and By-Laws of the Muldraugh Hill Baptist Church, a notice is hereby given of a Special Called Business Meeting to be held after the morning service on December 17, 1995. The purpose of this meeting will be to hear and act upon the following recommendations of the Steering Committee:

Having consulted with an architect who has submitted preliminary drawings and cost estimates, the Steering Committee presents the following recommendations to the Church:

- 1. The Church enter into an agreement with Mr. Brian DeMeers to be our project architect and have him proceed with working drawings for the **construction of a new multipurpose building**, as shown in the architect's preliminary architectural drawing dated November 20, 1995.
- 2. Construction of the building will not begin until the Church has a minimum of **\$100,000** in the **building fund**. It is estimated by the architect, that the proposed

building will cost approximately **\$200,000-\$250,000**, depending upon the final construction method chosen, the bid process, amount of church supplied-labor, etc.

3. The design of the building would be subject to final modifications by the architect and a **Building Committee** which will be appointed by the Church body to oversee the final plans and constuction of the building. The basic design concept as shown in architect's rendering, such as: the brick veneer exterior to match our existing building, conventional shingled roof, building dimensions, and overall intent of the rendering is to remain the same.

The vote (whether to build or not to build) will be taken from the members present during the Special Called Business Meeting. The vote will be taken by secret ballot. Members of the Steering Committee will start the business meeting with a motion and a second, so as not to put undue pressure on anyone. This will allow for discussion and a vote on the committee's recommendations.

The Steering Committee members will be available after each service on December 10, throughout the following week, and during the midweek prayer meeting service to answer and discuss any questions about the project and to give everyone an opportunity to become fully informed about the project.

On Sunday, November 2, 1997, the following persons were elected to serve with the pastor on the building committee: June Elliott, Lester Farmer, Kelly Holderman, Jim Sabo, Joan Stansbury, Ernest Carol Taylor, and Steve Yates. Ernest Carol Taylor served as chairman, Lester Farmer, vice-chairman, and June Elliott, secretary.



The groundbreaking ceremony was held on July 5, 1998.

During business meeting on July 8, 1998, **Ernest Carol Taylor** reported that the Building Committee had obtained bids for the Fellowship Hall and Sunday School rooms addition with a total of 7,746 square feet. Isaac Tatum submitted the lowest bid of \$316,000. The effective date of the contract is July 1, 1998. The official starting date is July 15, 1998. The project should be completed in 6-7 months. The Church will apply to the Ervin G. Houchens Foundation, Inc. for a loan in the amount of \$75,000 at 5% interest. If other funding is needed, local banks have agreed

to finance the remainder. The building committee seeks help, prayers, physical efforts, and financial support from everyone with this project.

Mark Carney was ordained as a deacon by Bro. Vic Stansbury on Sunday evening, September 6, 1998.

On December 9, 1998, it was reported that the Houchens Foundation granted **Muldraugh Hill Baptist Church** a loan of \$50,000. The payments are set up for 14-15 years at \$400 monthly at 5% interest. Approval was given for up to \$110,000 to be secured from Citizens Bank of Lebanon as needed.

The theme for the building program is "Come Grow With Us". In addition to the efforts and many hours work by the Building Committee, others who were instrumental in the completion of this project are Brian DeMers, architect; Isaac Tatum, contractor; Charles Yankey, brick layer; and Frankie Mattingly and Mike Gootee, electrical and plumbing contractors. Lester Farmer and Marion Payne donated the excavation for the foundation and the surrounding site. In addition, Lester prepared the site for seeding and sodding, constructed the driveway, and furnished the rock. Tommy Buckler donated his labor and expertise on installation of the cabinets in the kitchen and bathrooms. Kelly Holderman installed all appliances in the kitchen. Steve Morris installed all phone and communication lines. Mike Craig is working on a project to improve the acoustics in the Fellowship Hall. Bro. Vic and Joan and many other church members too numerous to name have donated countless hours cleaning, mopping floors, and moving church furniture in preparation for use of the building.



The dedication service for the new addition was held on **May 23**, **1999**. On July 18, the adult women were the first to occupy a classroom with other groups moving in during July and August.

DEDICATION SERMON FOR NEW BUILDING May 23, 1999

"...Except the LORD build the house, they labour in vain that build it: except the LORD keep the city, the watchman waketh but in vain." Psalm 127:1

"And the king, and all Israel with him, offered sacrifice before the LORD. And solomon offered a sacrifice of peace offerings, which he offered unto the LORD, two and twenty thousand oxen, and an hundred adn twenty thousand sheep. So the king and all the children of Israel dedicated the house of the LORD." 1 Kings 8:62-63.

Several years ago this building was but a dream in a few peoples minds, but today it has become a reality. I am thankful that we have had people dream the dream. Proverbs 29:19 says "Were there is no vision, the people perish:" Churches always need people who have a vision of things that the Church needs to do and accomplish for the Lord, if not it will soon wither and die. I am thankful for a Steering Committee that began to put this dream down on paper and brought it before the Church for a vote and to a Building Committee that carried out the wishes of the Church and saw to it that the dream became a reality in the buildign you see before you today.

But as we come to this dedication service today, let us not forget whose building this

really is. It isn't the Steering Committee's, the Building Committee's, the deacon's, the congregation's, or even the Church's. This building is the Lord's. Two hundred thirty-four times in the Bible do we hear the Temple referred to a "The House of the Lord." And in the New Testament when Jesus cleansed the Temple, He said, "You shall not make my Father's House a den of Thieves." So any Church must realize that its buildings are to be used as if it is God's House. And as such, it is meant to be used, not to glorify a committee or a Church, but to glorify our Lord and Saviour, Jesus Christ. We come then today to dedicate this building to God and His Son Jesus Christ. May He always be glorified by what takes place in this building. And may many young people and adults alike be brought closer to the Lord and one another through the activities that will take place in this building.

A committee was elected to draw up a policy regarding the use of church facilities in August of 1999. January 5, 2000 a Facilities Use Policy was presented for discussion, input for additions and questions. A Facilities Use Policy was approved, with the addition of listing the reason for use of the building, in April 2000.

Two young men of the church, **Donald Lee Veatch** and **Stephen Keith Benningfield** were ordained as deacons October 17, 1999.

On October 24, 1999, **Muldraugh Hill Baptist Church** celebrated its **125th Anniversary**. The celebration began with revival services: Wednesday, October 20th **Bro. Kit Yeaste** was the speaker; Thursday, October 21st **Bro. Harold Meers**; Friday, October 22nd **Bro. Richard Shields**; Saturday, October 23rd **Bro. Earl Pike**; and Sunday, October 24 **Bro. Bruce Hullettte**. On Sunday afternoon **Bro. William Beard** and others were given an opportunity to speak and reminisce. People were dressed in the garb of 1874. **Bro Stansbury and Joan** were brought to church in a horse drawn carriage driven by **Lynn Benningfield**. Pictures of the past were displayed in the Fellowship Hall. Dinner and fellowship followed the morning services.

November 10, 1999 the church voted to close the lower cemetery at New Market. Work was done on the cemetery across the highway from the church and a new fence put up in April of 2001. The upper cemetery at New Market was cleaned off and a new fence erected in the spring of 2002. The church reached its goal of \$30,000 to go into a perpetual fund to take care of the cemeteries in October 2002. The interest from the money will help with the upkeep of the cemeteries. Since interest rates are so low it was voted to start another savings account to eventually go into this perpetual care fund. The goal for this savings account is \$20,000 before interest will be applied towards upkeep of the cemeteries.

The church received an invitation to **Bro. & Mrs. E. V. Carrier's 65th wedding anniversary** at Somerset, KY in December 1999. **Bro. Carrier** was a former pastor and is now deceased.

During the church year of 1999, there were 7 additions by baptism and letter; the Sunday School Attendance average was 146; total receipts were \$158,115, and the recorded deaths were:

The History Of MULDRAUGH HILL BAPTIST CHURCH (2000-Present)

Barbara Jean Benningfield, Melody Mays, and June Elliott compiled the history of **Muldraugh Hill Baptist Church** from **2000 to Present.** Much appreciation goes to these ladies who spent many hours gathering information from church and associational minutes, church records and bulletins, and individual sources.

A ladies Bible study began January 31st, 2000. This study contained reflections on the life of David and was entitled "A Heart Like His" by Beth Moore.

We were given the status of our loans for the new addition in a business meeting held February 9, 2000. The loan is up for renewal and needs to be finalized on February 19th. We still owe Isaac Tatum \$4,000. We have \$5,102.59 in our Building Fund Savings Account. Including all interest we owe Citizen's National Bank (Lebanon) \$87,287.10. A motion was made to pay \$27,287.10 on our loan from our regular checking account. That will make our loan total \$60,000 from Citizen's Bank. The motion was approved. February 20, 2000 the church bulletin reads:

"This week we made our final loan at Citizens Bank on the new building. Our final loan at the bank will be \$60,000 plus we have already had a loan with the Houchen's Foundation for \$50,000 that we have already made a year's payments on. Thanks to everyone's generosity, our final loans were a lot less than we anticipated. The loan from Houchen's was set up for 15 years at 5% interest, with a payment of \$400 a month. We want to thank all of you for your continued support. Thanks to people who donated time, labor, equipment, and money to make this building a possibility. Thanks to those who have donated chairs, tables, kitchen appliances and supplies, wiring for telephones, decorations, basketball goals/equipment and volleyball equipment."

The church bulletin of November 5, 2000 states:

"This past week we paid off our \$60,000 note at Citizens Bank on our new building. This note was taken out in February of this year and has been paid off in just a few short months. Let us give God the praise for what He is doing in our church. We still have a note taken out with Houchen's Foundation for \$50,000 toward our building. We have made almost two years payment on this note."

A note burning for the Citizens Bank loan was held Sunday morning November 26, 2000.

A personnel committee recommended **Dawn Yates** as **Minister of Youth** April 23, 2000. Dawn is a member of the church and a student at Campbellsville University. She accepted the position

after the church voted to call her Sunday May 7, 2000. Dawn had served on mission teams to Texas, Eastern Kentucky and Brookhaven Mission in Lebanon, KY. In June of 2000 Dawn traveled to Taiwan for eight weeks to serve as a summer missionary there. In July 2001 Dawn along with **Bro. Stansbury and Joan** accompanied a group of our youth to Arlington, Texas on a mission trip. Dawn later resigned to take employment in Louisville, KY. **Wayne Downs** from Henderson, KY and a student at Campbellsville University had helped Dawn with the youth for a while and had gone to youth camp with them. On Sunday morning August, 2001 the church voted to call **Wayne Downs** as **Minister of Youth**. He served in this capacity for about a year. Wayne was given permission to take down the wall between the two rooms adjoining the old kitchen and use it for a youth room. He also helped build a pantry in what was formerly a men's restroom. Wayne resigned to take a position at Lebanon Baptist Church. In the mean time parents of the youth and some of the older youth served as youth leaders. December 8, 2002, **Eddie Fightmaster** was called to be **Minister of Youth**. He is a student at Campbellsville University and from Louisville, Kentucky.

Darrin Jenkins, Minister of Music submitted his resignation the first part of February 2000. Assistant Band Director at Campbellsville University, **Tim Michaels** led the music September 3, 2000. October 1, 2000 he was called to be **Minister of Music**. We have been without a music director for quite some time. Two of our members, **Benny Battcher** and **Jim Sabo** have been leading the singing in the Sunday worship services.

The organ the church is presently using was purchased in July 1978. April 5, 2000 it was brought to our attention the organ needed extensive repair. After several inquiries we learned repairs would be quite expensive and repairmen were few and far between. In September 2002 the music committee was asked to look into the possibility of purchasing a new instrument.

A decision was made to cease the opening assembly for Sunday School in July 2000. This was done so there would be more time in Sunday School classes.

In July 2000 the church was asked to donate copies of the Church History to Marion and Taylor County Public libraries and Campbellsville University. Mature Living magazine was subscribed to for Senior Adults.

Repair work to the nursery area began in August of 2000. The adjoining paneled room is now part of the nursery. The walls were dry-walled and painted, and new carpet was laid.

A wide screen television and VCR were purchased in September of 2000 for \$1625. Ping-pong tables, a coat rack and a soft drink machine were added to the fellowship hall in 2002.

Central Association hosted a tent revival at Willisburg Baptist Church in Washington County September 17 - 20, 2000. An associational wide revival was also held September 22-25, 2002 at Lebanon Baptist Church and Woodlawn Baptist Church in Lebanon. Bill Saye was the evangelist for both times. Our church participated in the services.

A proposed bid for blacktopping the drive at the sides and rear of the new addition was approved in the business meeting of October 4, 2000.

Ernest Taylor was asked to choose and activate Internet Service for **Bro. Stansbury's** personal computer. December 2000 **Muldraugh Hill Baptist Church** went on-line with Kentucky-On-Line. The e-mail address is <u>mhbc@kyol.net</u>. A committee was appointed to buy a computer for the church office in March 2002. No purchase has been made as of January 2003. A committee was appointed in August 2002 to construct a church web site and keep it updated. It was

reported at October's business meeting that the web site is up and running. The address is www.muldraughhill.org.

On Sunday, November 12, 2000 the church commemorated twenty years of service by **Bro. Stansbury** to **Muldraugh Hill Baptist Church.** Following is the event as found in the Lebanon Enterprise

"After months of secret meetings to plan and prepare a surprise celebration for the 20^{th} anniversary of Vic and Joan Stansbury with Muldraugh Hill Baptist Church, the big day, November 12, finally arrived. This was an exciting day and will be listed as one of the most memorable days in the history of our church. The day began with 176 in Sunday School as we studied from the book of Isaiah. There were 343 members and visitors present for the morning message, which was taken from the book of Luke and the story of the prodigal son. Many members of the Stansbury family were among the visitors who came to join us in our celebration. Special music was presented by Benny and Karen Battcher. Bro. Vic preached his first sermon as pastor of our church on November 30, 1980. His children, Vickie, Chris and Jon, have grown up and received their education in Marion County. All are now college graduates and are living in other areas of Kentucky and Tennessee. Following the morning worship service, a potluck meal was served in the decorated fellowship hall. A cake decorated for the occasion was presented for the Stansburys to cut and was then served as dessert. The afternoon service began with music presented by Bonnie Wicker, Estelle Brady, Anita Lanham, Goldie Graham, Nettie Summers, Tim Michaels and Tina Bradshaw. Mark Carney served as Master of Ceremonies for the afternoon program as we enjoyed comments and stories from Ron Rafferty, Ernest Taylor, Dr. Michael Carter, Rev. John Chowning, Rev. Al Hardy, Rev. Earl Pike, Steve Skaggs, Jim Durham, Rev. J. W. Hatfield, Max Richerson, John and Jan Simpson, Davette Mays, Billy Veatch, Sam Graham, and Ron & Jan Ellis. The church family presented the Stansburys with hand made beautiful cherry bedroom furniture and an elegant oak grandfather clock as gifts to honor their many years of faithful service to the church. A pictorial tribute composed of 585 slides with events of the last 20 years, designed and presented by Kaylene Poff was then shown. The afternoon service concluded at approximately 5:30 p.m. with all present joining hands and singing "Blest Be the Tie That Binds". We realize that the pastorate of Victor Stansbury extends beyond our church to many areas of Marion and Taylor counties. We recognize his love for God. We appreciate and love this couple very much and feel that God has blessed us through their leadership. We look forward to many more years together."

The following is a poem presented to Bro. Vic and Joan at the 20th Anniversary Celebration during the roast and prior to showing the Pictorial Tribute in the Fellowship Hall:

On Sunday, December 3rd, 2000 Sunday School attendance dropped to 65 because of snow. Christmas caroling the following Wednesday had to be postponed also because of bad weather.

During the church year of 2000, there were 7 additions by baptism and 8 by letter; the Sunday School Attendance average was 148; the budget for the year was \$140,200.58, and the recorded deaths were:

In the business meeting of January 2001 we voted to make a distinction between "Building Fund" and "Building Fund Loan". Money given to pay on the debt for the new addition will need to be marked "Building Fund Loan". Money marked "Building Fund" will go into a fund to take care of our church building needs such as a new roof, some other maintenance or repairs as needed.

There was a discussion of whether the church would benefit from being incorporated in April 2001. No action was taken at this time. In October 2002 the church voted to have a lawyer draw up a proposal for incorporating the church and present it for the church's approval.

A group from the church attended the Billy Graham Crusade in Louisville, KY June 21st, 2001.

On July 15th, 2001 the Sunday bulletin reads:

"Over the last few weeks, we have had several extra expenses at the church. We have had our tractor with belly-mower worked on costing over \$340. The Cub Cadet has blown an engine and we don't know what it is going to cost to fix it. We put tires on the van and other work on it that has amounted to about \$800. We have put a new roof on the church building at a cost of around \$7,000 and repaired a sidewalk that cost around \$800. It is expensive to keep things going. It takes all of us giving and working together to meet the expenses of the church."

September 11, 2001 about 8:45 a.m. America was attacked by terrorists. Two jet planes crashed into the Twin Towers of the World Trade Center in New York. Minutes later the Pentagon in Washington, DC was also hit by a plane. Thousands lost their lives and America suffered a great financial loss.

On Sunday, September 16th the bulletin reads:

"This has been a very hard week for our nation. We have all been deeply touched by the mass destruction and loss of human life brought about by terrorist attacks in New York and Washington DC. Each of us need to remember that our God is a loving God and the One we need to turn to in a time like this. Let us be in prayer for our nation and all those who have been affected by this terrible attack. Our hearts and prayers need to go out to the families of those who lost loved ones and for the injured. We need to keep those who are medical workers, police officers, and rescue workers in our prayers as they cope with the awful task before them. Pray for our President, Vice President, Congress and the leaders of our nation and other nations as they seek to respond to the situation. Continue to lift up our servicemen that may be called on to risk their lives to respond to this terrible act. Also pray for those who are responsible for planning this act of aggression that they might come to know the true God of love and be converted from their evil ways."

September 30, 2001: This past week, Nick Szymansky, one of our former Ministers of Music and Youth passed away in Louisville, KY. Nick served our church from September 1981 to November 1983. Nick's wife, Marty, started Mission Friends while she was here and Nick started the Sunday School Gazette. Another former Minister of Music and Youth, Steve Skaggs, was ordained November 4, 2001 at Valley View Baptist Church in Vine Grove, Ky.

During the church year of 2001, there were 3 additions by baptism and 6 by letter; the Sunday School Attendance average was 142; total receipts were \$136,597.05, and the recorded deaths were:

The Building Committee was asked to get information/estimates/bids for an elevator or lift in the new addition in March 2002. In June the committee reported that an elevator in the new addition would cost \$50,000. A lift could be installed for 16 to 20 thousand dollars but state codes will not allow a lift to go through a floor. If enough interest is shown a fund could be established and when a designated amount is reached we could go ahead with the project. No action was taken.



The family of **Evelyn Cooper** donated a shawl to the church in April 2002. The shawl was worn at the dedication of the first church in 1874. The History Committee was appointed to have this bit of history preserved by framing it in a shadow box.

At July's business meeting there was a first reading of a proposal to amend the Constitution By-Laws Article VII Section 7 and to add Section 15. Article VII Section 7 changes the number of members on the Personnel Committee from three to five. Adding Section 15 to Article VII forms a Youth Advisory Committee. The amendment was approved in the business meeting of August.

On September 8, 2002, the church bulletin read:

"We would like to start running the church van on Sundays to pick up people for church but in order to do this we need people who would be willing to drive the van".

Volunteers were asked to sign the insert and turn it in. This idea was first mentioned June 13th, 1999 and again in January 2003. There have been meetings of people willing to drive the van, but as of January 2003 nothing definite has been done regarding the matter. Amended regulations for use of the church van were approved in November 2002.

Central Association asked its churches to gather at the Marion and Washington county courthouses the first Saturday in October 2002. They were asked to gather at 10:00 a.m. to pray for their county and the people of their county.

During the church year of 2002, there were 4 additions by baptism; the Sunday School Attendance average was 131; total receipts were \$134,513.25; and the recorded deaths were:

The Sunday School Director for 2002-2003 was **Kelly Holderman**; the Sunday School Director for 2003-2004 is **Sam Graham**.

During the church year of 2003, there were 2 additions by baptism and 7 by letter; the Sunday School Attendance average was 129; and the budget was \$136,395.28.

Larry Bright was ordained as a deacon on September 28, 2003.

Several repairs and improvements were made to the church's properties in the year 2003. A new roof was placed over the existing one on the Fellowship Hall due to faulty shingles. Replacement windows and doors were installed on the parsonage and a dehumidifier was placed in the basement. A porch and ramp was added to the south side of the church building. Air conditioning units for the church sanctuary were replaced. The Sunday school rooms in the basement of the church were painted and the windows replaced with thermal windows. The carpet and pews in the sanctuary were cleaned by Coit Cleaners of Louisville in November. Several trees were removed from the cemeteries at New Market and some fencing was done around the unused cemetery. A row of pine trees was planted on the south side of the parsonage in November.

A fifteen passenger van was purchased from Pickerill Motor in Lebanon for \$16,000 dollars in October 2003. At the September 2003 business meeting **Chris Stansbury**, an attorney, presented The Articles of Incorporation. He stated most of the paper work involved had been completed. A motion was made to proceed with the legalities of becoming incorporated.

In March our country became engaged in war with Iraq. A special prayer service was held Sunday night March 30th for our service men and women. Those present were asked to name a loved one or someone they knew in the service or deployed to the Persian Gulf for prayer.

Beginning September 7th and going through December 15th, the Kentucky Baptist Convention asked its churches to participate in **"100 Days of Prayer".** A prayer guide was given out by the Convention to help with prayer concerns. The Convention held a special International Mission Board Appointment Service for missionaries at Rupp Arena in Lexington during their annual meeting November 11, 2003. Churches were urged to bring their members to this special service.

Some of the men and boys participated in a church softball league in Campbellsville. Other recreation activities included the youth traveling to Six Flags KY Kingdom for a Christian Concert Day, Youth Camp, church wide swimming party at the Campbellsville City Pool, Youth bowling, Senior Citizens meal, an occasional trip to Lincoln Jamboree, annual picnic and worship service at the farm of **Marion** and **Joyce Payne**, and a fall festival in October. The

Fellowship Hall was opened one night a week for recreation. The Marion County Board of education has used the Fellowship Hall for a third year for a summer reading program.

Gary Vidito, a former **Minister of Music**, presented a program of music entitled "Generation Reconciliation" February 9th. He is presently serving as Minister of Music at Taylorsville Baptist Church. In July a Civil War Band from New Mexico, participating in the Civil War Festival at Campbellsville University, performed special music for the morning worship service July 27th.

John Wesley Farmer who attended church here for much of his youth died September 16, 2003 in Lexington, Kentucky at the age of 78. He was the son of the late **Alvin and Nettie Farmer**. He is survived by his wife Bernice Jarboe Farmer and two children Lynn Farmer and Karen Marshall. Two sisters also survive Esther Veatch and Frances Skaggs. He became an ordained minister on December 8, 1949. His pastorates included Pikes Ridge Baptist and Walnut Hill Baptist Church in Taylor County, Kentucky; Menlo Baptist Church in Menlo, GA; Buice Memorial Baptist Church in Atlanta, GA; Little Untion Baptist Church in Fairfield, KY; First Baptist Church in Irvine, KY; First Baptist Church in Carrollton, KY; and Mt. Gilboa Baptist Church in Taylor County, KY. He was buried in Campbellsville at Brookside Cemetery with full military honors.

Quoting from the Bulletin of December 21, 2003:

"Our White Christmas Offering" will be taken up during the morning worship service. As in years past you will be given an opportunity to designate your offering to where you would like it to go. We still owe close to \$17,000 dollars on our building, about \$14,000 on our van and \$5,000 dollars for our milti-periol insurance. We also have a goal of \$1,500 dollars for International Missions, a cemetery fund, reclad Steeple Fund, New Organ Fund, etc. We also have large heating bills for the next few months. Money not designated will go into the regular offering to help meet our bills."

We had an outstanding White Christmas offering of \$16,188!!!

On January 5, 2004, the paperwork was sent in for the Articles of Incorporation.

On January 18, 2004 we had our first annual birthday celebration after the morning worship service. A table was decorated for EACH month of the year (we had some awesome tables) and members sat at their birthday month table. The church furnished a large birthday cake. The youngest and oldest member was recognized at each table. The oldest member present was **Mrs.** Lucy Benningfield (age 93) and Avery Rayann Cochran daughter of Kevin & Tracy Mays Cochran (age 2 months) was the youngest member. The tables were judged and an award was given to the best decorated table. The event was enjoyed by all!!!

The morning and evening worship services were cancelled January 25, 2004 because of an ice storm. Several surrounding churches cancelled also.

Larry Hunt, a layman from Taylor County, spoke at Sunday morning worship services, January 18. Larry and two other men went to Africa on a mission trip. Our church gave \$560.00 to help with their expenses. Larry spoke to the church about his trip June 13th. Dr. Eugene Shively spoke and showed slides of his recent Medical Mission Trip to Togoa, Africa on Sunday night May 23rd. Other mission projects, besides our special mission offerings, included purchasing school supplies for Brookhaven Mission in Lebanon and soccer balls for missionary Joe Beal to take to children in South Africa.

The basement of the church was painted in March, 2004.



On March 2, 2004, **Bro and Mrs. Stansbury** became grandparents for the second time. A girl, **Haylee Ray**, was born to **Chris and Heather Stansbury**.

Jason Logan's first Sunday with us as **Minister of Music** was March 21st. He is from Bowling Green, KY and a student at Campbellsville University.

A group from the church attended an Easter play March 25 at Southeast Christian Church in Louisville. Some of our members attended the "Passion for Christ" movie in Bardstown, KY on April 17th. A group of ladies traveled to Lexington, KY in August to attend a Beth Moore Conference in Rupp arena.

A carport was installed in May to serve as shelter for our vans.

On May 29, 2004 copies of the paperwork were sent to Frankfort for the Articles of Incorporation (since the paperwork sent in January had been lost!).

Eddie Fightmaster, our Minister of Youth, and **Teresa Sermon** were married May 29, 2004. Eddie and Teresa were instrumental in starting a Puppet Ministry with our youth this year.

Bro. Stansbury issued a challenge to the church in the bulletin dated June 20, 2004:

"As of Tuesday, June 10, 2004, we owed 10,894.22 on our new addition. Wouldn't it be great if we could get this paid off by our 130^{th} anniversary celebration on November 7, 2004? If 50 people gave an extra 220.00 each we would have 11,000. There are approximately 20 weeks between now and the 130^{th} anniversary, so that would average about 11.00 a week per person until then. Even better, if 100 people would contribute an extra 110.00 you also have 11,000. Spread that out over 20 weeks and that would be 5.50 per person per week. The most of us spend more than that for soft drinks or something else in a week. I would like to challenge us to work together to pay this off by our 130^{th} anniversary".



The **MHBC Men's Church League Softball Team** began play again June 28th at Veteran's Memorial Park in Campbellsville.

We were saddened to learn that the wives of two of our former pastors passed away: **Mrs. Mildred Janell Hullette**, May 30, 2004 and **Mrs. Gladys Carrier**, August 13, 2004.

Our Articles of Incorporation were filed July 13, 2004. (Receipt #0590254.09, Trey Grayson, Secretary of State).

An associational wide revival was held August 22 - 26, 2004 with Rev. Al Norris as evangelist. Nightly services were at Temple Baptist Church, Springfield Baptist Church and Willisburg Baptist Church in Washington County.

The church choir participated in the annual Central Baptist Association Music Night September 12 at Springfield, KY.

Work began the week of September 27, 2004 on the renovation of the steps and ramp out front. Henry Brockman is doing the work. You do not have to step up now to get in the front door of the church!!!

Bro. Vic announced on Sunday morning, **October 3, 2004**, that the loan on the new addition was **paid in full!!!** So we will be having a note burning at our 130 year celebration service Sunday morning, November 7, 2004.

During the church year of 2004 (from September 1, 2003 to August 31, 2004), there were 5 additions by baptism and 8 by letter; the Sunday School Attendance average was 130; and the recorded deaths were:

The budget of \$147,991.74 began January 1, 2004 and went through December 31, 2004. The budget called for an average weekly collection of \$2,846.00.

Joyce Payne, Melody Mays, and Kaylene Poff compiled the history of Muldraugh Hill Baptist Church from September, 2004 to August, 2009 for the 135th Anniversary, celebrated the week of November 4-8th, 2009. Much appreciation goes to these ladies who spent many hours gathering information from church and associational minutes, church records and bulletins, and individual sources.

The church choir participated in the annual Central Baptist Association Music Night September 12 at Springfield, KY.

Work began the week of **September 27, 2004** on the renovation of the steps and ramp out front. Henry Brockman is doing the work. You do not have to step up now to get in the front door of the church!!!

The following members volunteered as messengers to the Associational Meeting which was held **October 4, 2004** at Woodlawn Baptist Church: **Elizabeth Farmer, Joan Stansbury, Arlene Mullins**, and **Rev. Victor Stansbury**.

Bro. Vic announced on Sunday morning, **October 3, 2004**, that the loan on the new addition was **paid in full!!!** A note burning was held at our 130-year celebration service Sunday morning, November 7, 2004. The week of November 3-7, 2004 was scheduled to celebrate the 130th anniversary of MHBC with the activities as follows:

- Members (former & present) reminisced throughout the week of their memories of Muldraugh Hill. Also, a document of written memories was published.



As announced in the November, 2004 Business Meeting, the concrete and railing work has been completed and the parking lot has been sealed. The budget was approved for the 2005 Fiscal year with \$10,000 borrowed from Citizen's Bank for 6 months. The \$10,000 was paid off in January, 2005 using money from the Building Fund and the remainder from the Regular Fund. The only debt the church has left at this time is for the van.

A church-wide birthday party was held on January 23, 2005. The meal was pot-luck with the church furnishing the meat. Tables were set up and decorated, representing each month of the year. The members born in each month were responsible for decorating their table. An award was given for the Best Decorated table.

In February, 2005 the W. M. U. announced at the Business Meeting that the church had surpassed its goal for the Lottie Moon Christmas Offering by collecting \$4,074. A Financial Advisory Committee was approved of the following members: **Roger Barnett, Joyce Payne** and **Ernest Carol Taylor**. This committee will look out for the church's financial interests.

The youth had a church-wide Valentine's Meal on February 13th, 2005 following the Morning Worship Service. The meal was free but donations were accepted to help fund future trips and activities by the youth.



In the March 2005 Business Meeting it was approved to place a **flagpole with a floodlight in memory of Marion Payne** in the New Market Cemetery. The American flag can be seen waving from the road as travelers pass by.

Men's Day was March 13, 2005. The men were in charge of all activities of the church. They taught Sunday School and led the Worship Services. **Ernest Carol Taylor** and **David Veatch** were the speakers in the Morning Service and **Mark Speer** and **Steve Yates** were the speakers in the Evening Service.

The choir performed the Easter Cantata, **"Behold the Lamb"** on **March 27, 2005**. **Ernest Carol Taylor** and **Kelly Wise** were narrators for the program. Sam Graham took care of the sound.

May, 2005 – The Home Missions Offering received \$703.00, surpassing the \$650.00 goal. **Elizabeth Farmer** and **Betty Whitehouse** attended the State W. M. U. meeting in London.

The church set up a **"Phone Tree"** to help get information out to church members about deaths, sickness or emergencies that happen in our community. People in Marion County are asked to call **Elizabeth Farmer** at 270-692-3203 and those in Taylor County to call **Ernest Carol Taylor** at 270-699-2786. These people will proceed to call others on the list to spread the word.

All the mothers of the church were recognized on **Mother's Day, May 8, 2005**. Special recognition was given to "The Oldest Mother Present" (**Frances Hourigan**), "The Youngest Mother Present" (**Jessica Benningfield**), and "The Mother with the Most Children Present" (**Jean Sallee**).

Vacation Bible School was held on May 31st to June 4th, 2005 for children through grade 6 from 6 to 8:30 pm nightly. Parent's Night was June 5th with a program presented by the children, refreshments, and an inflatable slide and bouncy room for children to play on. The theme was "Ramblin Road Trip: Which Way Do I Go?" There were as high as 98 students each night.



A group went on a Mission Trip to Avon, Florida June 5 - 11, 2005 to help with the cleanup after the Hurricane. They worked with the Florida Baptist Disaster Relief Organization doing hurricane relief. Mission Team members were: Tyler Bright, Josh England, Beth Veatch, Kelsey Veatch, Jessica Reynolds, Allison Wise, Kellie Wise, Stacy Mays, Davette Mays, Stephanie Brady, Emogene Farmer, Goldie Graham, Obie

and Karen Whitehead, Eddie and Teresa Fightmaster (Youth Minister and his wife) Bro. Vic and Joan Stansbury.

June, 2005 – The church now has a Visa credit card with a limit of \$800.00. It was used for the first time on the Mission Trip to Florida. The Deacons recommended, and it was approved, for the following people to serve on the **Nominating Committee**: **Elizabeth Farmer** (W.M.U. Director), **Kelly Holderman** (Sunday School Director), **Dennis Wise** (Chairman of the Deacons), **Betty Cox, Judy Farmer, Bob Moore**, and **Mark Speer**.

On June 19, 2005, the church celebrated Father's Day. During the Morning Worship Service, all the fathers were recognized with special recognition given to "The Oldest Father Present" (Milton Farmer), "The Youngest Father Present" (Jason Benningfield), and "The Father with the Most Children Present" (Jim Sabo, Jr.).

There was a church-wide swimming party at the Campbellsville Swimming Pool on July 18th, 2005.

On Saturday, July 30th, a group went to the Lincoln Jamboree in Hodgensville to see **Steve Skaggs**, a former Minister of Music, perform.

August, 2005 – Glaze and repair was done to the stained-glass windows for \$2,600.00. Forty-five Braille books of Bible stories have been ordered and received by the church for **Amanda Livers**.

Director), **Sam Graham** (Sunday School Director), **LeAnn Moore, Ann Reynolds Lee, Bro. Stansbury, June Elliott**, and **Jean Peterson**. The following members were appointed to serve as **messengers to the Southern Baptist Convention** in Louisville, Kentucky: **Bro. Stansbury, Joan Stansbury, Willis Deitz**, and **Josh England**.

The Church celebrated **Father's Day on June 21, 2009** with recognition of and presentation of a gift to each of the fathers present. Then special recognition and gift was given to honor "The Oldest Father Present" (**Jim Bob Moore**), "The Youngest Father Present" (**Jason Benningfield**), and "The Father with the Most Children Present" (**Dennis Wise**).

Bro. Vic and Joan were honored on **November 21, 2010** with **a 30th Anniversary Celebration** of their years of service at MHBC. This was done during the Morning Worship Service and extended in the afternoon with a potluck meal and speakers. Cake, made by **Clara Evans**, was served with punch after the meal. **Bro. Al Hardy** was the guest speaker during the Morning Worship Service. **Mark Carney** was the Master of Ceremonies for the event. The **MHBC Adult Choir**, **The Sabo Family** (**Jim, Sr., Catherine, Jim, Jr., Austin**, and **MaKayla**), and **Paul Helm** performed special music during the Morning Worship Service. **Terry Cox** (the first baby born after Bro. Vic became the pastor of MHBC) rang the bell thirty times instead of the usual 11. The children born since Bro. Those who made the trip were: Bro Vic & Joan; Tracy & Avery Cochran; Melody & Davette Mays; Larry, Carol & Tabitha Reynolds; Kelsey Thompson (Stansbury granddaughter); Kellie Wise; Annette Dennison; Obie Whitehead; and Steve & Carolyn Morris. A report of the mission trip as described by Melody Mays:

"The Mission Team stayed at Good Shepherd United Methodist Church in Madison, AL. Facilities were the nicest we have EVER stayed in. That church and neighboring churches prepared our meals for us (we had never had that before).

Thursday morning we worked around the home picking up trash, etc., waiting on dry wallers to get done in the house. Joan went to Walmart and Sherwinn Williams to pick up all our supplies. Thursday afternoon a group consisting of Joan, Carolyn, Tabitha, Avery, Davette, Annette and Melody went to a local food bank On Friday, the team caulked, primed and painted walls and woodwork in this approximately 1400 square ft. home. For a short time, a group in between rains, went to another location to pick up debri. This group consisted of Kelsey, Annette, Carolyn and Tabitha. Manna House – Huntsville's Outreach With a Heart to help deliver hundreds of sandwiches and other food to those coming through the line. The others stayed at the house and got it ready for us to start painting.

Bro Vic & Joan traveled back to Nashville on Friday evening to deliver Kelsey for her ballgame on Saturday. The rest of the team toured the areas of devastation on Saturday morning and departed for their return trip home.

The house we worked on was the home of a 66 year old Vietnam Veteran. "Sonny" was not a firm believer before the tornado hit but was VERY TOUCHED by ALL the people who were taking their time to come work on his home for him. He was living in a FEMA trailer there on his property as the work was being competed on his home. They were going to leave Sonny's home in ruins but since it was the family homeplace and things just started falling into place with monetary donations and volunteers they hope to have "Sonny" back in his home by mid August."

Our oldest living church member, Exie Wise Shively, celebrated her 101st birthday on July 18, 2011. With the help of caregivers and her three daughters (Barbara Jean Benningfield, Mary Frances Veatch and Judy Shively Benningfield) she is able to be in her home. Although Ms. Exie is bedridden, her mind is brilliant and she continues to be a blessing to all who visit her. Ms.

Exie has six grandchildren: Donnie Veatch, Jean Veatch Sallee, Keith Benningfield, Kelly Benningfield Carney, Gary Benningfield, and Glenn Benningfield. She has 17 great grandchildren and 8 great-great grandchildren. Another great-great grandson is due to arrive September 1, 2011.

A group of ten people took a journey to **Manchester, KY on August 1, 2011** to deliver a trailer load of clothing to God's Closet. Thanks to Campbellsville University for the use of their trailer. Those going were: **Bro Vic and Joan; Betty Whitehouse; Melody Mays; Shirley & Kaitlyn Farmer; Dana & Isabella Hayden; Arlene Mullins**, and **Faye Porter**. The mission team also stayed late afternoon to help hand out approximately 175 book bags with school supplies to the children of Clay County. This program was also administered by God's Closet.

We can, of course, pray and have devotional times any time during the day but I believe following Jesus' example works best: "Very early in the morning, while it was still dark, Jesus got up, left the house and went off to a solitary place, where he prayed" (Mark 1:35). He spent time with His Heavenly Father the very first thing and we should too before the busyness of our day becomes a distraction.

This is the last day I will share my thoughts in this space. Thank you always for beginning your day here and for sharing these words with others. May you continue to "grow in the grace and knowledge of the Lord Jesus Christ" (II Peter 3:18) as you seek Him daily.

The virus, called COVID-19, "probably originated in bats....is believed to have started infecting people in Wuhan, China, in late November or early December. Since then, the virus has raced around the globe." Upon recommendation by the CDC, President Donald Trump, and KY Gov. Andy Beshear, large gatherings of people were prohibited and "social distancing" was encouraged. Muldraugh Hill Baptist Church, along with other churches, finally, on March 15, 2020, had to cancel services and activities and go to online telecast or upload video messages for the congregation until further notice.

A "One Call" system was purchased and registered in September 2020 that would make it easier to communicate with church members, keeping them informed of important news related to church activities.

During the **October 7, 2020 Monthly Business Meeting**, these changes were approved for the Constitution and Bylaws:

- Under Article VI Church Officers, Section 6 The previous position of church secretarytreasurer was changed to two positions: Clerical Secretary and Financial Secretary, including a brief description of their duties as determined by the personnel committee.
- Article X Church Finances, Section 4 Expenditure greater than \$10,000 Clarification of the description and process.
- Include this statement in Article VII, Section 14 Cemetery Committee "According to Kentucky KRS 367.952 regarding perpetual care and maintenance of cemeteries, amended July 15, 2014, no less than \$20,000 shall remain in an established "Cemetery Fund" with money exceeding this amount to be used to maintain the cemeteries."

Martha Dowell Shields (wife of **Rev. Richard Shields**) passed away on **October 19, 2020** at the age of 93. Houghlin-Greenwell Funeral Home in Bardstown in charge of arrangements. Bro. Shields pastored MHBC from 1958-1961.

Due to the COVID-19 pandemic restrictions, the church had a "Drive-Thru Trunk or Treat" activity on Wednesday, October 28, 2020, from 5:00 p.m. to 7:00 p.m. The theme was "Shine with the Light of Jesus!" Everyone stayed in their car while candy was given out in bags to each child as drove through the lot.

James Robert "Jim Bob" Moore passed away on **November 2, 2020** at the age of 95. He was a faithful servant of God and longtime Trustee and member of the Cemetery Committee.

Operation Christmas Child was done a little differently this year. There was not a packing party due to COVID-19. Boxes were packed by individuals and brought to the church on **November 15, 2020** at which time they were prayed over in both services. 72 boxes were collected and were delivered to Stewart's Creek Baptist Church in order to be shipped to their destination.

November 29, 2020: Governor Beshear has ordered restrictions for the state to continue at least through December 13, 2020 secondary to the increase in COVID-19 positive diagnoses, hospitalizations and deaths. As a result of these restrictions, there will be NO WORSHIP SERVICES on DECEMBER 6, 2020. Also, the December Business Meeting scheduled for December 9, 2020 will be postponed to a later date, yet to be determined. The deacons and Bro. Billy will be meeting on December 9, 2020 to make a decision regarding services and activities to be held later in the month. These decisions are being made to best protect the health and wellbeing of our members and visitors.

Due to COVID-19 and social distancing regulations, and our goal to do what we could to protect our members and visitors, **the Christmas Eve Candlelight Service, on December 24, 2020, was VIRTUAL this year.** The service took place at 6:00 p.m. and was viewed on Facebook and Vimeo. The Lord's Supper was observed during the service, using individually prepared communion cups that were provided to those present during either of the Worship Services on December 20, 2020. **Bro. Steve Skaggs** and **Lidiane "Ms Ligi" Macedo** (video-taped from her home in Brazil) shared their musical talents during the service with a message delivered by Bro. Billy Compton.

On Sunday, **December 27, 2020**, we collected our Annual White Christmas Offering during both Morning Worship Services at 10:00 and 11:15 a.m. We appreciated the very generous offering of **\$25,358.00** (\$1,720.00 of this was given to designated funds). We also collected canned and other nonperishable items that we normally collect during the "Hanging of the Greens" service that had to be cancelled. This year the items will be given to local school resource centers since the collection date for Brookhaven will have already passed.

The Monthly Business Meeting was held on **January 6, 2021**. Bro. Billy reported that Western Recorder will no longer be published, so for news, go to KYBAPTISTCONNECT. Also, these changes were approved for the Constitution and Bylaws:

- Article VII Committees Section 7 Personnel Committee adding information regarding the "Muldraugh Hill Baptist Church Hiring Policy".
- Article VII Committees Section General limiting the number of "close relatives", as described in the "hiring policy" to the makeup of committees.

The Monthly Business Meeting scheduled for February 9, 2021 had to be cancelled due to hazardous weather conditions of freezing rain and snow.

Bro. Richard Maurice Shields passed away on **February 13, 2021** at the age of 94. Houghlin Greenwell Funeral Home were in charge of arrangements. A memorial service is being planned for later in the spring. His wife, Martha, passed away last October 19, 2020. Bro. Shields pastored MHBC from 1958-1961.

Due to the weather forecast, the egg hunt was done inside the church. It was a fun time for everyone.

Maundy-Thursday was held **April 1, 2021 at 6:30 p.m**. We gathered around the Lord's Table for a very special and unique time of worship that focused on the Last Supper.

On **Good Friday**, **April 2**, **2021**, our sanctuary was open for prayer between 10:00 a.m. and 3:00 p.m. During these hours, worshippers were invited to come on their own time and prayerfully journey—individually or in groups—through Christ's path to the cross using Scripture, prayer and devotional art.

Easter Sunday morning, April 4, 2021, culminated the events of Holy Week as we gathered to celebrate and worship our risen Savior!

- There was no evening service or activities. Members and visitors were asked to spend this time with family while recognizing the blessings from God and what He has done for us.

Love and Service committee review and appreciation luncheon was held Sunday, **February 13th** at 12:30 in the fellowship hall. Lunch was provided for all committee members as we serve together in 2022 around the theme of "Knowing Jesus and Making Him Known".



Jamie Lawrence, from Campbellsville University, led the music with the assistance of our Minister of Music, Kathy Snow.



Kentucky Today (Kentucky Baptist news) published the following article:

LEBANON, Ky. (KT) - A year ago, a member of Muldraugh Hill Baptist Church suggested the church host a tent revival. That suggestion led to a successful four-day revival effort last week, and Pastor Billy Compton is optimistic that it will be the momentum to see more people finding new life in Christ.

"I think our church has been in revival," Compton said, noting there have been 20 additions since June. "We were on a roll having somebody join the church every month leading up to revival," he noted. The tent revival had a high attendance one evening of 215 and a low of 128. "We averaged about 175 people or so, and it was comfortably full with 200 chairs under the tent. We wanted to make it a community event."

The revival culminated with four people being baptized in a watering tank.

"A lot of churches haven't had revivals in a long time, and it's probably been 15 years since I led one," Compton said. "We started planning this one last fall and we got the tent in the spring. We have a nice big area to put the tent, and we wanted to make it visible. We had perfect weather — only God could do that for us."

The revival effort started Sept. 18 with Steve Skaggs, a retired preacher from the church, bringing the message. That evening's preacher was James Jones, who pastors at nearby Pleasant Hill Baptist Church, and he brought his congregation on that evening. On Monday night Dan Durham, from Stewart's Creek Baptist Church in Marion County, was the preacher. On Tuesday night, GenZ was the targeted audience with Christian Naylor, pastor of First Baptist in Russell Springs, being the preacher. The final night featured Kenny Rager, KBC church evangelism strategist, as the preacher. We had a guy at the revival who used to work at the Tennessee Baptist Convention, and they had a tent they would let churches use. He told Compton he wished churches would think about doing tent meetings again because it gives visibility in the community. "I'm glad we did it," Compton said. "Who knows, we may do it again — for this day in time, it was a grand experience."

Prior to COVID, the church had worship attendance in the 200 range, and like most churches found its attendance decreased when the pandemic subsided. But Compton says Muldraugh Hill is poised to make a strong rebound— already having 80-85 percent of its congregation return.

"We're a two-town church," Compton observed. "Muldraugh Hill is between Lebanon and Campbellsville, so it is not a typical country church because it draws people from both communities."

Also, the church is undergoing major renovation, so the use of a watering tank to baptize four people was a unique feature of the revival.

"My son-in-law, David Atcher, is worship pastor at Westport Road Baptist in Louisville, and two years ago they had an outdoor service and my granddaughter had made a profession of faith, and I baptized her outside in that watering tank. My son-in-law took the tank home to store it." Compton said that is the tank that was used to baptize four people during the revival.

"I had led a lady to the Lord in a gym, then she brought her mother to see me. She told me her mother had never been baptized." So those two, along with two students who made professions of faith, were baptized in the tank.

On the last night of the revival, those who were baptized were given certificates and prayed over. Also, deacons, Sunday school teachers and other church leaders were brought to the front and prayed over.

Compton noted that people were faithful to giving. "Our people gave over \$5,000 from Sunday to Wednesday in a revival offering. For a church our size, that is over \$1,000 a day. God was working in it and it created a great sense of getting past COVID and moving toward the future — a future of new life, of people getting saved."



Immediately after the service on **September 25, 2022**, we enjoyed a "potluck" fellowship meal under the tent left up after the revival. The church furnished the meat, bread, and drinks. We had some wagons lined up so it was just like back in the "good ol' days"! It was a great time of good food and fellowship!

We had an adjuster to look at the roof damage that the church received during a storm in May. The results of that inspection were made available and a church-wide notification was done to announce a Special Called Business Meeting on Sunday, **October 2, 2022**. This was in the church bulletin on October 2, 2022:

According to our Constitution and Bylaws, a specially called business meeting may be held to consider special matters of significant nature. A one-week notice must be given by announcement for the specially called business meeting, unless extreme urgency renders such notice impracticable. This Special Called Business Meeting is deemed to be of urgent need for the following reasons:

• The church roof will need to be replaced before the next phase of renovation in the sanctuary can be started due to the expected accumulation of dirt and debris coming from the removal and replacement of the roof. All of the interior of the church, including the pews, musical instruments, sound system, flooring, etc. will have to be protected with plastic sheeting.

• Both roofs need to be replaced before the weather becomes colder as the heat of the sun is needed to set the shingles.

The insurance company has approved the amount of just under \$100,000 to pay for the costs of replacing the church and parsonage roofs secondary to weather related damage.

This will not cover any repair of the steeple as it is considered to only have cosmetic damage. However, the steeple will have to be lifted off of the roof and suspended by a crane at a cost of \$2,450 in order to repair the roof. If this is not done, there will most likely be leaking under the steeple at a later date, due to the way the steeple is manufactured and attached to the building. Each additional day the steeple requires being left suspended will cost an additional \$850. The insurance company has approved coverage of the costs for one day and the roofer's goal is to get this part of the roof replacement done in one day so there should not be any additional costs to us.

Additionally, it is recommended to add insulation and 7/16 OSB over the tongue and groove decking before installing the roof itself. This added insulation and OSB, at a cost of \$9,900, is not covered by the insurance allowance. The trustees and deacons make a motion to proceed with the added cost of the insulation and OSB. According to our Constitution and Bylaws, since the amount is below \$10,000, we can go ahead and take a vote today. This will prevent further delay in the replacement of the roofs and the renovation process of the sanctuary will be allowed to continue as planned. Thank you.

A paper ballot vote was taken with 117 total votes and 100% yes. The roof will now be replaced prior to proceeding with the renovation of the sanctuary.

We had a traditional Truck N Treat event on Friday, **October 28th, from 6-8:00 p.m**. Members decorating trunks and the youth served chili as a fundraising activity for the program.

In recognition of Veteran's Day, we honored and remembered our veterans during the morning worship service on **November 6, 2022**.

113 packed Operation Christmas Child Shoeboxes were prayed over during the **November 20**, **2022** Morning Worship Service.

We had our "Thanksgiving Celebration Banquet" after the Morning Worship Service on November 20, 2022.

We had our Annual "Hanging of the Greens" Service on November 27, 2022.

The "Church-wide Christmas Card Delivery Service" was done from **Dec 4th—18th, 2022**. Members brought the Christmas cards they wished to send to members of the church and Sunday School classes passed them out.

The MHBC Adult Choir presented the Christmas Cantata on **December 4, 2022** during the Evening Service.

The proposed budget as developed by the Stewardship (Budget) Committee was presented at the Monthly Business Meeting on **December 7, 2022**. There was an increase of about \$15,000 over last year and it calls for an average weekly collection of \$4,828.04. It was approved without any changes.


We had our Annual "White Christmas Offering" on **December 18, 2022**. We had recordbreaking very generous gifts of 34,590.76! A little over \$19,000 of that was given to the general fund. The rest was given to a specific fund such as: "Embrace Tomorrow", Lottie Moon, Safety/Security Fund, Cemetery Fund, Children's Ministry Fund, and Youth Fund.

"The Heart of Christmas Eve" Candlelight & Lord's Supper Service was planned for **December 24**, **2022** to begin at 5:00 p.m. However, it had to be cancelled due to snow and ice. Record temperatures of -6 with wind chill around -30 were experienced as well.

Christmas was on Sunday this year. It snowed and was really cold but we were able to have the service with 114 people attending. We recognized the Lord's Supper as well. Several men of the church had helped to clean the parking lot and side-walks the day before so traffic would be less hazardous. Christmas will not be on Sunday again for eleven years, in 2033.
